The town clock looked down on a drizzling rain and a small market Saturday morning. It might have been surprised at a few things it heard. Butter stuck around 58 to 59c a pound. Eggs, strictly fresh, did not make much of a showing but what was displayed sold at 85 and 90c a dozen. Potatoes are climbing again, with the price at \$1.90 a bag. Apples varied all the way from \$1.25 a bag for noddies to 60c a peck for northern spies. There was not much variety on the market. The staple lines of butter, eggs, potatoes, fowl and fresh meats were not broken by any unusual offerings. Onions were offered in a few places at fifty cents a peck. Cabbage and celery were in abundance.
