

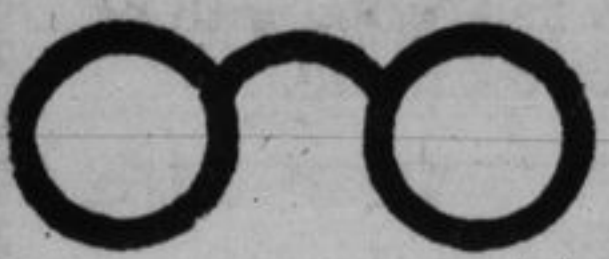

A MIGHTY CRUSH AT TURKEY FAIR

It is Said That Some \$75,000 Was Spent at the Napanee Market.

(From Our Own Correspondent) Napanee Dec. 4.—Dec. 1st and 2nd was turkey day in Napanee and surpassed all former years in volume of business and prices realized. Six car loads of fowl were shipped out of Napanee, and the money realized was close to \$75,000. Turkeys brought 48 to 50c; ducks and geese, 35c; and chickens 30 to 35c per pound. Buyers from all the large produce houses in Toronto and Montreal were present. From early morning streams of people arrived from every direction, all laden with the season's delicacy. By ten o'clock on Thurs-day it was almost impossible to drive through the throng that lined the sidewalks. The cars could not accomo-date one-quarter of the vehicles which were lined up for blocks in every direction waiting their turn to unload. In many instances the buyers intercepted them and purchased their load before they could get near the market. The carters have had a busy day, hauling the two days pic-niques to the railway station.
