HOLDS IT OVER FOR A REPORT

Canada's Amendment to Strike Out Article X of the League.

Geneva, Dec. 6.—Consideration of the amendment to the covenant of the League of Nations, which would eliminate article X, has been postponed by the assembly of the league until next meeting.

Consideration of the report prepared by Hon. N. W. Rowell, of Canada, and Rene Viviani, of France, on the relations between the assembly and the council, in the course of which was planned for to-day's session.

His Body Found on the G.T.R. Line West of Ernesttown.

Greece to Receive No More Financial Aid From Britain

Woodstock Young Man Will Leave Chorus Girls Alone Hereafter.

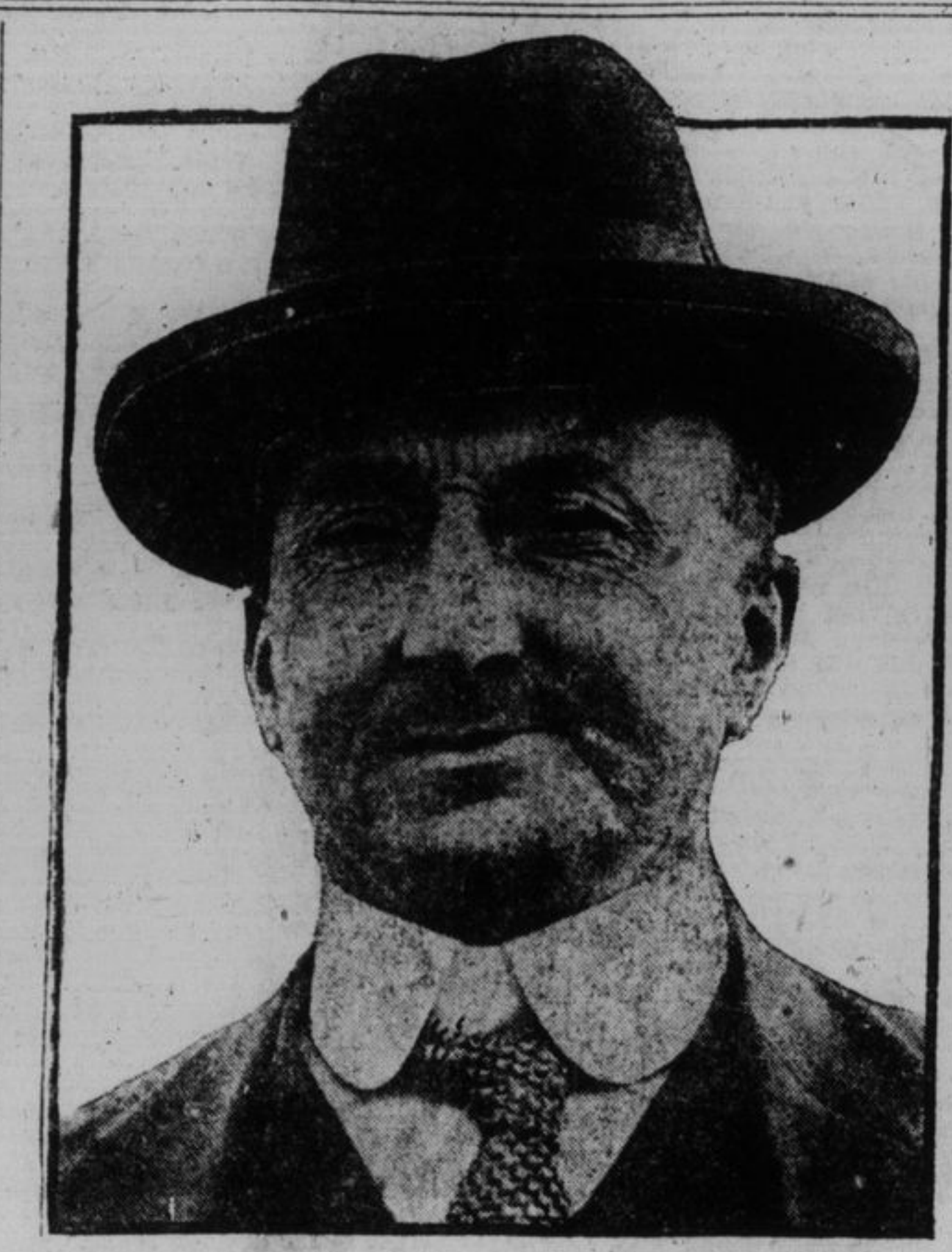
