Credit Restriction.

Touching on the restriction of cre-dit in Canada, he said this was in the Bank's and the country's best interests, and it was but following a policy found essential in every other country. There never had been a period when the requests for advances for purposes out of the or-dinary had been so numerous, and it was safe to say that had credit been granted freely and banking resources become tied up, a serious condition would have resulted in this country.


