Victoria, B.C., Dec. 13.—If Premier Oliver decides to hold his Delta seat and resign the one in Victoria, Lady McBride, widow of the former premier of this province, may be the Conservative candidate. PREDICTS DOOM OF SUBMARINE.

Terror of Seacraft to Navy Practically Non-Existent.

London, Dec. 13.—The doom of the submarine is predicted by Archibald Hurd, naval expert of the Daily Telegraph, in a special article published by that paper. He points out that even in July, 1916, the hydrophone made it possible to detect the presence of submarines. With the further improvements which have been introduced as a means of locating submarines the terror of the seacraft to a navy has become practically non-existent, he declares.
