**TO AID AGAINST CRIME**

**Members of Provincial Police Force to Act in Each County.**

In an endeavor to help put a stop to crime in this province, and to facilitate matters, the Ontario Government is appointing members of the Ontario police force in each county town under the crown attorney. Everett A. Rao has been appointed for Brockville and has taken over his duties. No appointment has been made for Kingston as yet, but it is expected that a man will be put on the job here shortly.

According to the information at hand, it will be the duty of this force to attend, under the direction of the crown attorney, to police work in connection with all parts of the county where there is no police force. It will be his duty to enforce the criminal code, the Ontario Temperance Act and any provincial statutes, but no municipal by-laws which will be left to the municipal authorities.

The appointment of a provincial man for Kingston and district, will be greatly appreciated. At the present time, Frontenac county has a police force of one member—a high county constable. There has been a great deal of trouble throughout the county over thefts, and it has been impossible to cope with the situation. The appointment of a man from the provincial force should be a great help to the city police, as there is great need of co-operation between the city and the county. Some time ago, the city police were in great need of help from the county in running down some thieves, and had they been able to get support, they would have been able to have rounded up a gang.
