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YOUTHS POINT REVOLVER INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

At Napanee Officers—Kingston Police Make Their Arrest Here.

Elmer Robinson and George Stockbridge, two Kingston youths, were placed under arrest by police constables Timmerman and Leslie Clark at an early hour Thursday morning, on the charge of offering liquor for sale and also pointing a revolver at the licensee Inspector, W. S. Exley, in Napanee, on Wednesday night about twelve o'clock.

Inspector Exley and Chief of Police Barrett, Napanee, who came to the city to take the two prisoners back to Napanee where they will face trial, told a Whig representative their story. Inspector Exley stated that he heard there were a couple of young men in town who were offering liquor for sale, so he decided to round them up. He saw the two prisoners on the street, and asked them if they had any liquor to sell and he was immediately told that if he would go to the automobile they would furnish him with the liquor. When the inspector arrived and the young men were about to hand over the liquor, one of them spotted Chief of Police Barrett coming up the street. Stockbridge first pulled an automatic revolver on the inspector, and when Robinson saw that Stockbridge was pointing a revolver, he pulled out his own and pointed it at the inspector. Before the chief of police and the inspector could get their hands on the young men, they had jumped in the car, leaving the liquor on the road, and made off. The Ford automobile, which they drove, did not have any lights so it was difficult to get the number.

At 1.30 a.m. the local police were communicated with, and they were successful in locating the pair. Chief of Police Barrett said that he would likely charge the young fellows with driving a car without lights.

Made Clever Arrest.

Robinson and Stockbridge were rounded up, as a result of a clever piece of work on the part of Constables Nicholas Timmerman and Leslie Clark, and Chief of Police Barrett and Inspector Exley were well pleased with their work.

It was 12.40 Thursday morning, when word was received at the police station from Chief Barrett, at Napanee, about the men wanted. It was stated that they had made their getaway in a Ford car, and a description was given of the pair. Constables Clark and Timmerman were on the lookout on their first watch after the telephone message was received from Napanee, and at 1.20 o'clock they picked up a clue, when they located a Ford car at the corner of King and Queen streets. The constables shadowed this car through a number of back streets until it finally came to a stop at a house on Sydenham street, near Raglan road, and here the officers cross-examined the occupants of the car, who turned out to be Robinson and Stockbridge. The officers believed them to be the couple wanted in Napanee, and took them in charge and here they were held at the police station, pending the arrival of Chief Barrett and Inspector Exley.

A BAKER WAS FINED

As Police Inspection Showed His Bread Was Under Weight.

A local baker, whose bread was found under weight, in a recent inspection made by the police department, was fined \$20 and costs, by Magistrate Farrell, in police court Thursday morning.

The baker, and his counsel, pointed out to the court that the only reason they could give for the short weight, was the fact that the bread was turned out at night, and that there was a certain amount of evaporation, when the police made an inspection of the bread on the street during the day.

In all 153 loaves of bread were seized by the police department. The law calls for each loaf to be 1 pound 8 ounces. The police allowed for a shrinkage of one ounce, but each loaf was still an ounce short, showing up at 1 pound six ounces.

On the order of Mayor Nickle, the confiscated bread was distributed among needy families in the city.

Acknowledges Resolution.

The board of railway commissioners, Ottawa, has acknowledged the receipt of the resolution passed by the Kingston Board of Trade, requesting that the Canadian Pacific Railway be directed forthwith to comply with the order issued for the construction of freight sheds in this city.

The Board of Trade is acting in the interests of the merchants of Kingston who carried on an agitation for some years for better facilities for freight handling by the C.P.R.

Was Sentenced at Windsor for Robbing Passenger Car.

John Bates, who has been brought to the Portsmouth penitentiary, from Windsor, to serve a term of seven years, has a criminal record of eighteen years.
