

A BAKER WAS FINED

As Police Inspection Showed His Bread Was Under Weight. A local baker, whose bread was found under weight, in a recent inspection made by the police department, was fined \$20 and costs, by Magistrate Farrell, in police court Thursday morning.

The baker, and his counsel, pointed out to the court that the only reason they could give for the short weight, was the fact that the bread was turned out at night, and that there was a certain amount of evaporation, when the police made an inspection of the bread on the street during the day.

In all 153 loaves of bread were seized by the police department. The law calls for each loaf to be 1 pound 8 ounces. The police allowed for a strinkage of one ounce, but each loaf was still an ounce short, showing up at 1 pound six ounces.

On the order of Mayor Nickle, the confiscated bread was distributed among needy families in the city.
