MORE TEACHERS REQUIRED

Frontenac Salaries Increased—Twenty Teachers Are Without Certificates.

"With the decrease in the cost of living, and the increases in salary which the teachers in the rural schools in the county of Frontenac have received during the past few years, the teachers are at last coming into their own," was the statement of Inspector S. A. Truscott, to the Whig on Friday.

Mr. Truscott, when asked about conditions in the rural school sections, stated that the increases in salary, which the teachers had received during the past year or two, had brought up the maximum salary for the county to \$1,200 and the minimum to \$500. Only in two or three cases are teachers being paid less than \$600. The highest salary paid is to the teacher who is principal of the public school in Sydenham. The case where the assessment of the school section was \$10,000, and the salary of the teacher, which was formerly \$400, had now been increased to \$700. A very large number of the teachers who hold second class certificates are receiving \$800 and \$900 a year, which is considered very good pay.

For years past there has been a dropping off in the number of boys and girls who decide to follow the school teaching profession, mainly for the reason that the salaries paid in other lines of work are much larger, and for that reason the boys and girls on the farms come to the city to make their living. It is to be hoped, with the decrease in the cost of living, and the increase in salaries that the teachers have received, that and more farmers' sons will decide to follow the profession of school teaching, or else there will be a great shortage of qualified teachers.

At the present time, there are about twenty teachers who are without a teaching certificate. This is an increase of about five over the previous year.

Many people who reside in the rural districts are commencing to realize the great need of centralizing the school sections into one large school, as by so doing the scholars would get better educations. At the present time, there are school sections in the county of Frontenac where there are some three scholars in attendance at a school. If a couple of these smaller schools would unite,

the scholars in most cases would benefit greatly. At the present time there is a movement on foot in the Sydenham area to try and centralize their school sections.

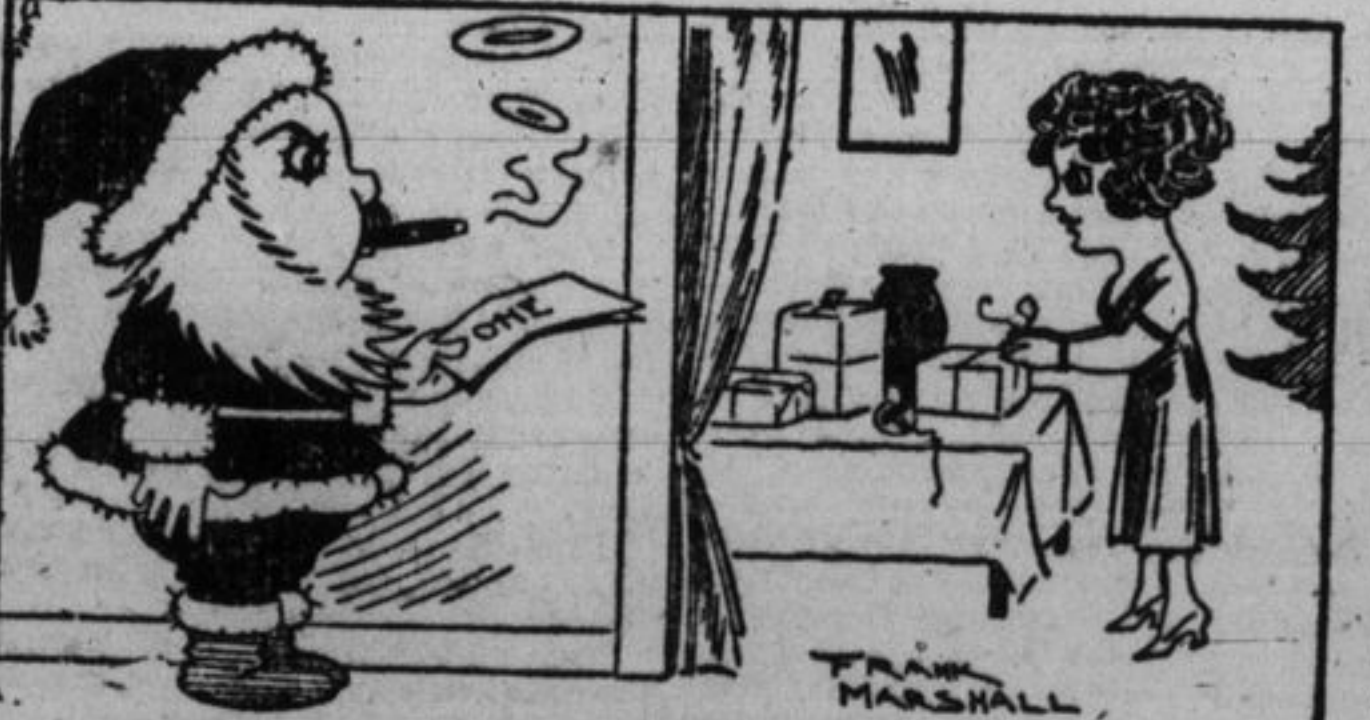
It is stated that many of the teachers who labor on the school sections have to pay \$7 a week for board, which doesn't leave a great deal for other necessities.

Figures of Cheese Factory.

Railton, Dec. 15.—Railton Model Cheese factory for the past season received 1,844,703 pounds of milk and made 163,905 pounds of cheese, with an average of 11.25 pounds of milk per pound of cheese.

The cheese sold for \$43,738.16, or an average of \$26.68 per hundred weight. The butter fat of the whey realized \$1,449.79. The patrons received \$41,063.30, an average of \$2.22 per hundred weight for their milk.
