Four Dollars a Day for Meals and Lodgings at Port au Prince.

Port Au Prince, Dec. 18.—Labor and living are cheap in Hayti. There is a hotel in the suburbs, rated as the best, that charges only \$4 a day for a room and three square meals.

The same meals could not be obtained anywhere in United States at double the price. Luncheon is a regular dinner, and dinner is much like an eight-course feast.

The favorite dish is the chicken, served 365 days in the year without the least variation.

Laundry at American rates would cost more than room and board in Hayti if there were laundries. There is much to be got from each room daily to washerswomen, and it comes back as tip to the proprietor.

But Hayti has not reached the point where it may bid for tourist travel.

A man, stopping at the best hotel here to spend his first time, feels rather foolish when he asks for room and bath and is conducted to a little house 50 feet away where he may get a shower.

The best, however, is in sharp contrast with the worst for the laborer gets twenty cents a day, and thousands of natives live only on fruit that grows wild everywhere, the year round, like the roses.

ARE HOLDING MESSAGES

Because of Irish Disorders, Says Western Union President.

Washington, Dec. 18.—Direct testimony that business messages from the United States sent over British cables during the war had come into the possession of British business interests was given to a Senate committee by Captain F. K. Hill, formerly a United States naval attaché in South America countries.

The committee also learned from Newcomb Carlton, president of the Western Union Telegraph Company that the British naval intelligence authorities now were holding up for examination all cable messages from Great Britain to the United States.

Mr. Carlton was unable to say whether messages to Great Britain or diplomatic messages were being subjected to such examination, but promised to let the committee know as to the latter.

Captain Hill testified that the most glaring instance of United States messages getting into the hands of British concerns was when the General Electric Company submitted a bid for certain electrical installations for a Brazilian job received, next day, a bid from an English concern to supply the same articles at a lower price than the United States firm offered.

This testimony was adduced at further hearings by the committee into the general question of cable communications and the three-cornered controversy over the landing of a South American cable at Barbados, which involves a question of a British cable inter-coastal monopoly in Brazil.

Mr. Charlton, in discussing the holding up of United States messages in Great Britain now, said there was some justification for the practice as the purpose was to throw light on internal disturbances in Great Britain now, chiefly, I suspect, with reference to Ireland. He added that his company had taken a firm stand on the matter, but had been assured that no censorship would be imposed.
