Port Au Prince, Dec. 18 .- Labor and living are cheap in Hayti. There is a hotel in Port au Prince, rated as the best, that charges only \$4 a day for a room and three square meals. True, the rooms are small, with the aucient wash-bowl, and unlockable, with concrete floors and rugless, but they are clean and comfortable.

The same meals could not be obtained anywhere in United States at double the price. Luncheon is a regular dinner, and dinner is much like an eight-course feast. They never serve less than two or three meats, when one, according to the American habit would be enough. There is fruit in abundance in Hayti. and a boy standing on the front porch, overlooking the sea, often picks the breakfast oranges.
