RUSSIAN REFUGEES IN PITIFUL PLIGHT A Brother of M. M. Hood Writes About the Fleet-

ing People.

M. McIntyre Hood, a former member of the Whig staff but now of Woodstock, has received an interest ing letter from his brother, Pte Samuel W. Hood, who is on active service with the 1st Battalion, Gor-don Highlanders in the British Army of Occupation in Turkey. The letter was written at Haidar, Pasha, near Constantinople, on November 21st, and at that time the refugees from the Crimea were arriving in thousands. It tells of the pitable conditions of the refugees, and also gives the impression that British troops

have been sent to the Crimea. The letter says in part: "I left Touzla on November 10th for Haidar Pasha, where we are in lovely barracks in what used to be a Turkish School of Science. It is ait fitted up with electric lights, but there are no fires in it. Nevertheless we are quite comfortable, as there is a whole ompany in each room. I told you'l expected to be home by Christmas, but now I will not manage that, as there are about three hundred of our men in hospital and a great many have been sent home as unfit for service in this country. Latest orders are that the battalion is to be here for two years in the army of occupa-

Last Wednesday about seventy thousand Russian refugees arrived here from the Crimea. It was a pitiful sight to see them. They were half-starved, and many of them had very little clothes. They landed without food or supplies of any kind. Our battalion collected about fifty pounds to buy food and clothing for them. Russia is in a terrible condition just now. The Royal Scots Fusiliers left here for India, but instead of going there, they landed at Sebastopol in

The letter goes on to say that the weather is very cold in Turkey at the present time, which adds to the suferings of the refugees. The writer has been in Turkey with the British army of the Black Sea, for the past eight or nine months.

REV. F. J. DAY, D.D.

Preached in the Congregational Churches On Sunday.

Rev. F. J. Day, D.D., Toronto, director of the Forward Movement of the Congregational church in Canada, was the special speaker at Bethel Congregational church on Sunday morning. He spokesupon the forward movement in the church, and showed he great impetus given in the work of the church by that movement. Instead of \$130,000, the sum asked for, the people had subscribed \$220 .-000. He told how this money was beng used in the home and foreign mission fields, but in addition to promoting this work, it had enabled the board to create the augmentation fund from which the salaries of ministers were established upon a more satisfactory basis, and provision made for the incapacitated clergy, the widows and orphans.

But while the financial results were most gratifying, there was a greater object to be attained by the forward movement. This was the more efficient service of the church. and it was the duty of all capable of rendering service to give of their time, thought and energy in promoting the various activities that offered opportunities for their talents. Rev. Mr. Day concluded with a strong appeal for personal service as a part of the forward movement. The solo, "Jesus Saviour, Pilot Me," was sung by Fred Haffner. On Sunday evening Rev. Dr. Day spoke, on the same subject in the First Congregational church.
