**AGED ATHENS LADY DEAD**  
Ex-Warden Ferguson Rendered Unconscious By Fall.

**Brockville Fire Losses.**  
Brockville's fire losses as shown in a report presented by C. G. Rose to the city council amounted to \$35,074 during the year. The building permits totalled \$210,000. The retiring mayor, W. A. Lewis, announced his intention of tendering his colleagues a banquet before the close of his term.

**\$30,000 From Turkey Fair.**  
The Almonte Poultry Fair held on Wednesday was the largest in the history of the town. It was thirty per cent. better than last year's which up to 1910 had been the Almonte record. No less a sum than \$23,000 was taken in through the banks so that probably in all the total money taken was about \$30,000. Last year the total sum realized was \$21,000.
