SHEFFIELD'S MEMORIAL.

To Its Sons Who Fell in the Great War.

Tamworth, Dec. 17.—The war memorial committee is to be highly congratulated upon the erection of the splendid memorial to the memory of those valiant and heroic sons of the township of Sheffield, who went to France in the service of their king and country. The memorial takes the form of a monument of gray granite, fourteen feet in height, three feet in width, and a half feet in thickness, and one and a half feet in thickness. It rests upon a cement foundation and is set facing the cross roads in the centre of the village, occupying the vacant triangular lot next to the township hall. The memorial is of pleasing design, having a large cross deeply engraved upon the side facing the streets. Beneath the cross are the names of those fallen, cut in sufficiently large and deep to be easily seen. On the two sides are the names of those who returned, having faithfully and honorably discharged their duties to their eternal credit. The unveiling of this very acceptable memorial will not take place until the plot has been suitably arranged. The committee intend to have the grounds levelled and grassed over in the spring. Trees will be set out on the sides facing the two streets, and two German guns, secured for the village by place on the plot, have been suitably foundations, one on each side of the memorial. When completed, as planned, the memorial will not only adorn the village, but will be an everlasting tribute to the memory of the loyal, the brave, faithful and heroic members of the township of Sheffield during the great war.

The Township in Debt—Need of Consolidation of Schools.

Sunbury, Dec. 16.—The final meeting of the Storrington Municipal Council of 1920 was held on the 15th at John McBride's. All members were present. The municipality is not in good standing financially, and heavy taxes will be the programme for years yet to come. The poll clerk and returning officer for the elections were appointed, for there is to be a real "general" election. The nomination meeting will probably be held in Inverary on Wednesday, as the agricultural hall has been offered free of charge in the former place, and the Orange Temple in the latter. Why not use the vacant church in Sunbury and keep things where they have stood for so many years?

The matter of building or rebuilding the township hall will be presented to the ratepayers, and the place to put it will be a topic of dispute, though most people believe that it was pretty well located before. But population shifts, and the future needs must be considered, so that is the cause of the vote.

The Ida Hill school has been closed for some months. Perhaps it is cheaper to let things take their course, as has been done in some places, but there is also argument for consolidating several of the small schools in this part of the township, and a vote on this at the annual meeting might be a good way to get people to attend.

Militia Department Provides Work at Barfield for Unemployed.

With the purpose of giving work to returned soldiers who are in need of employment, the militia department has decided to take down the remainder of the hutments on Barfield commons. Lieut.-Col. Dunbar, engineer officer of the district, when speaking to the Whig on Monday morning, stated that he had engaged twenty-one men to start with, but he expected that there would be about one hundred men on the job when the work got underway. Tamworth, Dec. 17.—The war memorial committee is to be highly congratulated upon the erection of the splendid memorial to the memory of those valiant and heroic sons of the township of Sheffield, who went to France in the service of their king and country.
