**Off On Her Holidays.**  
Miss Janet L. Conley, who has been training in the Kingston General Hospital has been accepted to be a nurse. She is at present on a two weeks sick leave through being vaccinated. She is staying with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Conley, Renfrew.

**Opens Hamilton Practice.**  
Dr. Stanley H. Perkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. Perkins, Brockville, a graduate of Queen's University, has opened an office in Hamilton, and is specializing in nervous diseases. Dr. Perkins has pursued a post graduate course in nervous diseases and is well qualified.

**To Have Utilities Commission.**  
A bylaw was passed by Napanee council creating a public utilities commission to control and manage the water works system. This bylaw will come into force after it has obtained the assent of the electors. There will be two elected members and the mayor.

**Right Arm Broken.**  
George Warren, Ferguson, met with a serious accident while working in the woods. A falling tree was coming in his direction when he put up his right arm to save himself. The tree struck his arm and both bones were broken. Mr. Warren was attended to by Dr. N. McCormack.

**Will Return Later.**  
Major W. J. McManus, acting G. S. O., Military District No. 3, who has been in Brockville, for some weeks in connection with the re-organization of the Brockville Rifles, returned on Monday night to Kingston. He will go back to Brockville after the New Year, when drills will be resumed.

**Extensions to Plant.**  
The Canada Starch Company is at present building a new grinding room and an extension to its boiler room at the Cardinal plant. Six or seven double houses for employees are also being built, situated in the field formerly used as race track. It is said to be the intention of the company to build 20 or 30 more.

**Throws Stone; Costs \$150.**  
In the last case coming before a Belleville jury verdict was given for one hundred and fifty dollars damages for the plaintiff, Mrs. Catherine Fluke, Thomasburg, in her action for \$500 against Clarke Maynes. The evidence showed that on April 16th Maynes had thrown a

stone at a cow, belonging to plaintiff, and which was upon defendant's property. The cow's leg was broken. Mrs. Fluke sued for the value of the cow, which died, and the loss of profit. Maynes admitted throwing the stone.

**A Kindly Resident Dead.**  
At the Fulford Home for Aged Women, Brockville, the death occurred on Thursday of Mrs. Phoebe Ann Manhard.  
The late Mrs. Manhard was twice married, her first husband, William Percival, predeceasing her in 1877 as a result of a railway accident. The late Mrs. Manhard spent the many years of her life in Brockville. She was of a gentle and kindly disposition and her demise will be deeply regretted. She was a Methodist in religion.

**Girl is Fatally Burned.**  
A fatal accident befell eight-year old Margaret Hills, a pupil of S. S. No. 5, Wollaston, North Hastings. While she was standing near the stove getting warm, her clothing became ignited, and before the teacher, Miss Higgins, or other scholars could extinguish the blaze she was burned so badly that it was impossible to save her. Dr. Harding, Coe Hill, was called and the child was taken to her home for treatment, but she died shortly after arriving there.

**To Buy Site For Temple.**  
At a regular meeting of the Masonic Temple Association of Clayton, N. Y., the following directors were elected: Dr. William J. Ross, Dr. Jas. H. Stebbins, Ernest Serrell, A. J. Bennett, Clarence F. Hall, D. H. Holloway, W. E. McMullin, A. E. Potter, A. A. Barnhart. The Masonic Temple association was recently incorporated for \$5,000 for the purpose of buying and holding property and to build a temple. A fund for running expenses will be started in the near future.

**In The Wood Business.**  
The Perth town council has again branched out in the wood business, a number of fine bushes having been purchased, and a large gang of men has been employed in cutting logs and hauled. Over 100 cords of slabs have been purchased from the Caldwell Company, at Lanark, and all has been hauled and placed in the wood yard. Last year the town handled hundreds of cords of both hard and soft wood, and instead of going behind, as many other towns did, there is a neat balance.

**County Court Case.**  
T. M. Costello, Renfrew, was in Pembroke, Wednesday attending the session of the county court. There was only one case on the docket, that of Eady vs. Sheahan, both parties of Cobden. It was a suit to recover possession of about eight acres of land and \$100 in damages. The judge in his decision restored part of the land asked for and reduced the amount of damage asked for to \$25.

**Boy is Killed by Horse.**  
Leo Shannon, aged nine years, son of James Shannon, residing in the fifth concession of Tyendinaga township, was, on Saturday afternoon, the victim of a distressing accident and one that proved fatal. The lad was assisting in doing the chores and had occasion to go into the stable, when a horse kicked him in the forehead, inflicting a terrible wound. The victim was yesterday brought to the hospital, where an

operation was performed to relieve the pressure upon the brain.

**Combining the Offices.**  
It is proposed at Renfrew to have Mr. Maidment fill three offices, caretaker of the armouries, overseer of the fair grounds and the playgrounds, while still retaining his position in the employ of the town. It was stated that it had been found impossible to secure a returned soldier for caretaker of the drill hall. The military department will furnish Mr. Maidment with a free residence at the armouries, free water, light and heat and pay him a cash salary of \$120 a year. The fair board directors will allow him \$350 a year and it is proposed that the town pay him \$50 a month instead of the \$100, which he now receives.

**A Fine Tribute Paid.**  
The Berliner Gramophone Co., Ltd. have paid a very fine tribute to the men who left their employ to take part in the great war. A handsome tablet has been erected on the Lacasse street side of their new million dollar plant, which has just been erected in Montreal. The tablet is suitably inscribed and bears the names of the employees who left to take part in the great struggle, two of whom, Donald Robinson and Emile Gerrard, made the supreme sacrifice.

**An Extraordinary Pig.**  
Some people are evidently not aware that the war is over, says the Perth Courier. Perhaps they are right at that—but this is not a tale of people but of a pig, not an ordinary one by any means, but one which has contributed so liberally to the great cause of production as to be worthy of newspaper attention on more than one occasion to wit and to who, as the lawyers and owls say, one Yorkshire, owned and appreciated by George Cook, Corbyville. This sow gave birth to twenty lusty young porkers not long ago, thus adding materially to her record of nineteen on April 15th last, or a grand total of one hundred and eight pigs in six litters, covering a period of a little over three years. She is four years old, and her highest record is twenty-one in one litter.

**Want Better Distribution.**  
Ottawa, Dec. 22. — The women teachers of the Ottawa public schools are determined not to allow the question of salary increases to stand for three another year without what they consider a more equitable distribution of the yearly boost. The teachers are asking for bulk increases to teachers who have been faithfully engaged in the profession for twenty years or more, and lesser increases for three to twenty years' service.

**VENERABLE CLERK OF LAMBTON DEAD**  
Loved to Recount Meeting With Late Sir John A. Macdonald.

Sarnia, Dec. 22.—John Dalziel, the venerable clerk of Lambton county, died at his residence, 435 Christina street north, in his 83rd year. Deceased loved to recount a meeting with the late Sir John A. Macdonald. On the way from Montreal to Toronto, his train was boarded late one evening by Sir John and a party of friends. A sleeping accommodation was limited. Mr. Dalziel offered Sir John a share of his berth. The offer was accepted, and the two slept soundly until the train reached Toronto. While dressing, Sir John asked Mr. Dalziel where his home was. "Lambton County," replied our friend. "I thought so," Sir John retorted. "The first night I had of your red whiskers, I said to myself, 'There is one of Alexander Mackenzie's supporters.'"

**Death Summons Bishop.**  
New York, Dec. 22.—Charles Sumner Burch, Bishop of the New York Diocese of the Episcopal church, died suddenly here on Monday. Heart failure is thought to have caused his death, which was unexpected, although the prelate had not been well for several days.
