"Linger Longer Letty" To-night.

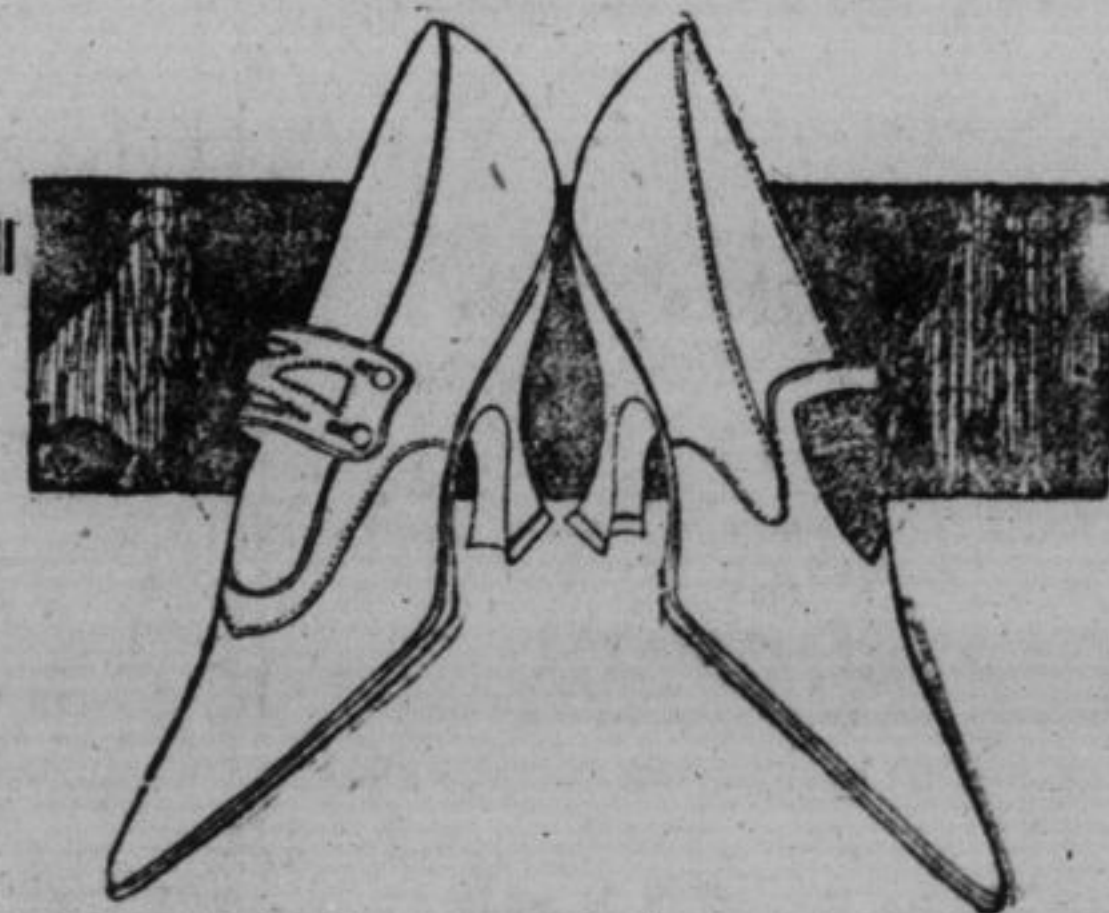
