DEMPESEY ON DECLINE Declares a Critic Bright Lights and Careless Training Beginning to Tell on Champ.

William H. Rocap, writing in the Philadelphia Ledger, has the following to say about the Dempsey-Brennan bout:—

"It did not take a trained eye to discover that the Jack Dempsey who defeated Bill Brennan in Madison Square Garden, New York, last Tuesday night, was not the same man who made big Jess Willard quit in Toledo, O., July 4th, 1919. Something was wrong with the man. There was no flash to his eyes. The snappy punch was absent, and the force was not there. His footwork was slow and sloppy, and the man who has always been a moving target to his opponents, at times was like a fixed statue. Some critics were unkind enough to say that the champion did not extend himself. Others charge the bout as being ten rounds for the pictures and two for Dempsey, with all his speed and power."

Were these two statements founded on fact, they would stamp Jack Dempsey as being the greatest ingrate the ring has ever produced. Before the bout he was so confident of his ability to finish Brennan quickly in a few rounds that he advised his nearest friends to wager all they could risk. Thousands of dollars were wagered and lost with Dempsey's confidence as a basis. One man who stood by the champion through all his trials and tribulations during his combat with the Federal Government is said to have dropped \$7,500. Two other close admirers who were let in on the confidence stuff lost \$4,000 and \$2,000, respectively. In all, it is claimed more than \$50,000 changed hands as a result of Dempsey's surety of beating Brennan in jig time.

Do you think Jack Dempsey would throw these men down? Every one of them paved the way for the champion to recoup his shattered purse. They used their moral support to have him reinstated in public favor so that he might corral the big purse which was his after the Brennan bout. Dempsey may have committed many mistakes. He may have absorbed some of the sunning of his arduous manager, but he has not as yet learned how to fake. It is foreign to his make-up.

When Brennan pinned him on the chin with a right half-uppercut in the second round, the blow stung the champion. It awakened every bit of latent fighting blood that trickled
