#### TO FULLY ESTABLISH FEDERAL CONTROL

So as to Conserve the Lake of the Woods Level.

Ottawa, Dec. 23.-Federal legislation will be enacted at the coming session of Parliament with regard to the vexed question of the Lake of the Woods levels arising out of the Ontario Government's concession to E. W. Backus. The sceme affects both water powers of Northwestern Ontario and those of Manitoba. It has been thought that concurrent legislation might be enacted by the provinces of Ontario and Manitoba toratify the concession and afford whatever protection is necessary, but the federal government is interested in the navigation is interested in the navigation aspect and in view of this jurisdiction, legislation is pro-posed here to fully establish federal conrtol A conference on the subject was held at Toronto last Friday between Premiers Drury and Norris, and it is understood that the Federal legislation was agreed to by Mr. Drury. Ottawa is not concerned about the extensive area of the concession, but is vitally interested in the navigation aspect, and both provinces have now come to recognize this constitutional condition. The legislation, therefore, will be Federal and not concurrently provincial, as has been suggested, and it is intended to so frame it as to adequately conserve the water levels.
