MAN O' WAR SET SEAL ON THE RACING YEAR

Wonder Horse Made Past Season Most Distinctive of All Time.

Man O' War made the thoroughbred racing season of 1920 the most distinctive of all time. This remarkable three-year-old by Fair Play-Mahubah stood out like a giant among his kind and so dominated the year that all else sank to a point almost of insignificance. Some day another thoroughbred may rise up which will equal or surpass the accomplishment of Man O' War, but until that day comes Samuel D. Riddle's super-horse will stand forth as the greatest and best ever bred in this country, if not in the world.

These are strong words, but none too strong, as a mere recounting of his deeds will testify. Man O' War was unbeaten in eleven races and wound up a long campaign against horses of his own age by galloping to the easiest kind of victory over Sir Barton, the best of the older horses, in that now famous match race at Keenelworth Park, Windsor, Ont., for a purse of \$75,000 and a cup valued at \$5,000, the richest prize ever offered in the history of the sport.

In winning eleven races this amazing horse established three world's records, two American records and four track records. He took his place at the top among the great money-winning horses of the American turf by earning \$249,265, thus supplanting the previous high mark, established by Domino at \$193,550.

He was the first American horse to win \$200,000 and over, and, furthermore, he jumped to fourth place among the leading money-winning horses of all time, and not far behind Interglass with \$250,675, Donovan, with \$275,812, and Rock Sand with \$250,845.

For Chess Title.

A match for the chess championship of the world and a purse of \$20,000 will begin at Havana on March 10th, between J. R. Capablanca, of Cuba, and Dr. Emanuel Lasker, of Berlin. According to an announcement made in New York, the two greatest exponents of the game have agreed to all the arrangements made for the contest, which will consist of eight to twenty-four games.

Barkett to Coach Giants.

Jess Barkett, baseball coach at Holy Cross and a member of the Giants thirty-one years ago, has been signed as coach of the New York National Leaguers. He will act as assistant to Manager McGraw and Hughie Jennings.

Cobalt Nugget.—The Liskeard team are developing the same kind of hockey as that employed by the Canadians; they are using the Flying Frenchmen's favorite back-passing and cross-checking, which, many a time, has carried that team to victory. They bear the ear-marks of good coaching.

HOCKEY NOTES.

Jack Robertson, one of Whitley's most promising hockey players, is in a serious condition as the result of an automobile accident.

The St. Johns, Quebec, Intermediate Amateur Hockey League, the Verdun League and the Garrison Hockey League of Quebec have been granted affiliation by the C.A.H.A.

The Pacific Coast Association is seeking the services of "Mike" Goodman, champion speed skater of Canada, and leading goal-getter with the Winnipeg Falcons.

President Frank Calder has notified the Ottawa Hockey Club that if the N.H.L. players refuse to report to the club they have been allotted to they will be suspended indefinitely.

According to a new ruling in the Peterborough City League, any team not prepared to start on time must forfeit a goal, which will be credited to the opposing team. In the event of two teams not being ready for the referee's bell, the time lost will be deducted from the time allotted for the game.

ARMY OF GOLFERS IN BRITISH PRO. TOURNEY

British golfers are losing no sleep over preparing their 1921 list of dates. Already the English professionals have decided on May 11th and 12th as the time to compete for the largest sum offered at the annual competition in this country, when the "Daily Mail" tournament will be played at Formby, Lancashire. The money awards, will total six hundred pounds.

Previous to the tournament proper there will be eight qualifying competitions throughout the British Isles, and a hundred players will take part in the finals at seventy-two holes medal play. This meeting is on the same order as the Professional Golfers' Association championship in the United States, the only difference being that the "pros" here meet at match play instead of medal.

Shows Old Hockey Ability. Harry Scott, one-time Canadian hockey star, and former resident of Winnipeg, is still hitting up the high spots in the ice pastime, despite his advancing years. Harry is now thirty-four years of age, but he jumped into a senior City League game at Calgary the other night, and led the Crystals to a 5-3 victory over the Tigers, scoring three goals and registering an assist. Harry helped the same team win the championship last winter. He has been granted an amateur card.

Hockey Candidates at Harvard. Hockey players will be numbered at all games held in the New Boston Arena. The management announced that this will be a new departure for the majority of college teams playing here. The Harvard team's first practice of the season was attended by more than sixty candidates. With but two exceptions the regulars lined up with a veteran seven. Coach Claffin plans a two-hour daily practice for the remainder of the season.

BABE RUTH IS HIMSELF BIFFED FOR BANK ROLL

Babe Ruth has just returned from Cuba to the U.S.A. If he hadn't started when he did, he might have had to swim and drape himself in a barrel after landing. The Babe has been "took" on the Havana race track. He thought he had a set of winners and they are still running. In all, the Babe dropped \$35,000, according to statements affirmed to-day by book-makers, Cuban sports and American friends. "This isn't all, nor half of it," says Miller Huggins. "Babe has his troubles in baseball. He was 'taken' for \$27,500 in the picture game recently. The picture proposition blew up and left Babe stuck for his sum. 'That's the record, I think, for any ball player.' 'Sold for \$150,000, made fifty-four home runs and 'gyped' for more coin than any other ball player ever received in a single season, and Babe won't even let out a yell. He'll just grin and take it as if it was the best joke in the world.'"

NEW ADMISSION RULING

N. Y. State Boxing Commission Sets Maximum Charge. A \$15 maximum admission for championship boxing contests in New York state and \$10 for ordinary bouts is ordered by the State Boxing Commission. Exception is made only in the case of bouts for charitable purposes. The commission notified clubs to arrange no bouts in the future at higher rates.

Declaring that the high prices of tickets "have been caused, in a large measure, by the exorbitant demands of certain boxes who cared little about the public upon whom they depend for their awards" the commission said, "the time has come when this selfish and short-sighted attitude must be corrected." Allowing to pay double the prescribed rates to see boxers of high calibre it was added, the commission believes "it is a hardship upon the man of moderate means, who is just as much entitled to see champions in action as his wealthier neighbor."

The first annual report of the boxing commission and the licence committee will be made to the legislature in a few days.

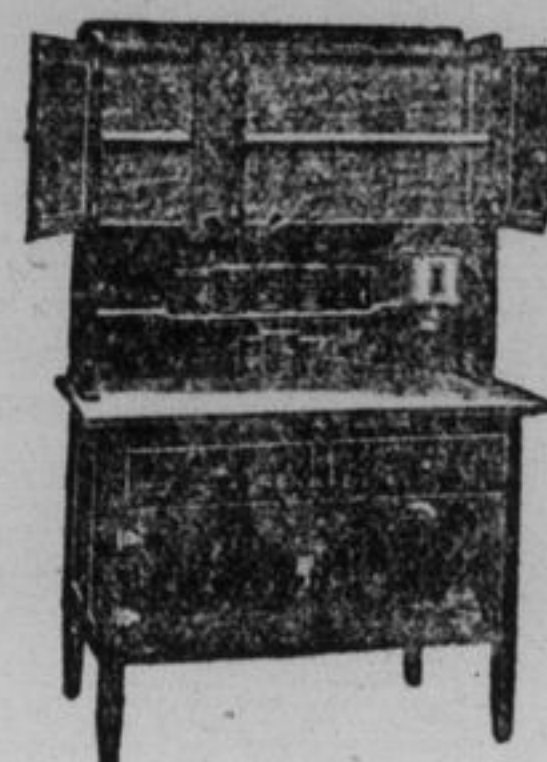
