These are strong words, but none too strong, as a mere recounting of his deeds will testify.

Man o' War was unbeaten in eleven races and wound up a long campaign against horses of his own age by galloping to the easiest kind of victory over Sir Barton, the best of the older horses, in that now famous match race at Kenilworth Park, Windsor, Ont., for a purse of \$75,000 and a cup valued at \$5,000, the richest prize ever offered in the history of the sport. In winning eleven races this

amazing horse established three polis. world's records, two American records and four track records. He took his place at the top among the great money-winning horses of the American turf by earning \$249,265, thus supplanting the

previous high mark, established by Domino at \$193,550. He was the first American horse

to win \$200,000 and over, and, furthermore, he jumped to fourth place among the leading money-winning horses of all time, and not far behind Isinglass with \$280,675, Donovan, with \$275,812, and Rock Sand with \$250,848.


