Municipal Insurance Scheme.
Mayor Macdonald, Renfrew, in his message to the new council at the inaugural meeting, called attention to the fact that although the town is spending nearly \$10,000 a year for fire protection, insurance rates are higher than ever. As soon as one standard of efficiency set by the underwriters is attained some other requirements have to be met. The mayor suggested a system of municipal fire insurance protection. He proposes to call a meeting of financial, industrial, commercial and labor organizations to discuss these questions, and to secure provincial authority to inaugurate such plans. Economy was the keynote of the message, all questions involving expenditures to be referred to the people.

Death of Taylor Resident.
At the family home, "Prairie View," Taylor, death came to John Dundan, on Saturday, January 8th. Deceased had been a patient sufferer for the past three months, and fortified by the last rites of his church and surrounded by his family and some friends, he passed peacefully to rest.
