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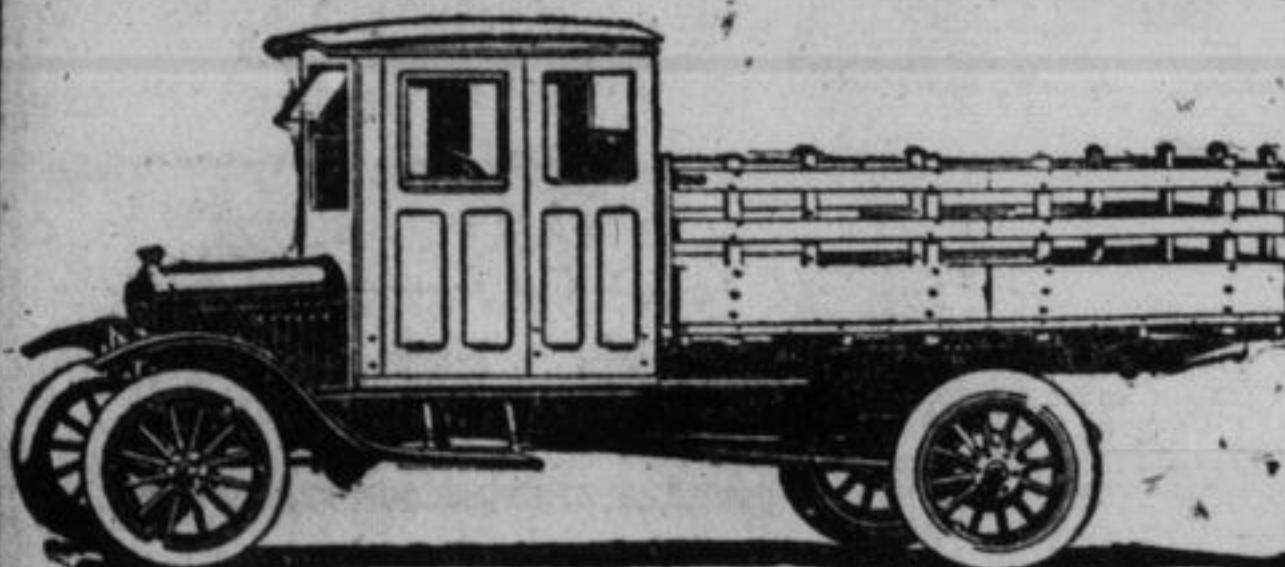

## WALKER SEEKING A BOUT

Offers to Throw Fraser Ten Times in One Hour.

People who saw the wrestling bout between George Walker, Canadian champion, and Charlie Fraser, champion of the C.E.F., in this city recently, will be interested to know that Walker is looking for another bout, and writes to the Whig, issuing a challenge through its columns. Although it is not generally known, it was primarily through the instrumentality of this paper's sport department that the first bout between these two artists of the mat was held in Kingston. Fraser, desiring to try his luck against Walker, wrote to the Whig, asking for information and issuing a challenge. The letter was placed in the proper hands and the bout was the result. Here is George Walker's letter:

Ottawa, January 12th. Sport Editor, British Whig: Dear Sir,—I wish to again issue a challenge through your paper to Charlie Fraser. The only reason I would issue a challenge to Fraser is because I understand that he has been telling his friends in your town that he could beat me. Now, I'll give him a chance. I'll take him on in a handicap match to throw him ten times in one hour for any side he wishes to name.

### The Ring.

George ("K.O.") Chaney, Baltimore, knocked out "Al" Murphy, Scranton, Pa., at Philadelphia, in the fifth round of a scheduled eight-round bout. Chaney had the better of the bout all the way. In the first round he sent the Scranton boxer to the floor for a count of nine. The men are lightweights.

It is almost certain that Johnny Kilbane, world's featherweight champion, will not defend his title in New York state, despite the fact that Tex Rickard offered him \$25,000 for doing so. Kilbane says he must have \$50,000 for his services, which Rickard declines to offer.

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## THE COLLEGE BOXERS MUST "STAY OUT"

Ottawa Section of the C.W.A. Likely to be Formed.

Ottawa Citizen: Following the creation of the Eastern Ontario branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada it is expected that the Canadian Wheelmen's Association will establish a branch or section to coincide with the new unit of the athletic union. The wheelmen are closely affiliated with the athletic union, and in the past both governing bodies have operated with provincial branches and with laws that are very similar.

As a result of developments the annual meeting of the Ottawa Bicycle Club, which was scheduled to be held next Tuesday, has been postponed until such time as prospective arrangements reach a definite basis. With the organization of the proposed Eastern Ontario branch of the C.W.A., Ottawa would become the headquarters for a district which would extend to Pembroke, Brockville, Smith's Falls, Prescott and possibly to Kingston, where the Ottawa club assisted in staging an Olympic bicycle trial last June. Officers of the proposed bicycle sport branch here would issue sanctions, pass upon the amateur status of riders, provide riders' licenses and conduct other features of the game.

A CULLING MATCH BY BRAMPTON OCTOGENARIANS Joseph P. Allan, an active member of the Brampton curling club and a vice-skip on one of the club's best rinks, has forwarded a challenge to Beverley Jones, an octogenarian member of the Toronto curling club. Mr. Allan would like to engage Mr. Jones in any kind of curling competition that may be mutually agreed upon.

Brampton's candidate is in his eighty-second year and still an active and very enthusiastic curler. In 1915 Mr. Allan was a member of "Tom" Thaburn's rink in the Ontario Tankard. He would be pleased to engage Mr. Jones in any curling competition that may be agreed upon, and would prefer that games be played both here and in Toronto.

"Mickey" Lalonde, former Toronto catcher, is sought by the outlaw league, which proposes to include the players expelled in connection with the World Series scandal. Con. Jones has commissioned "Billy" Fitzgerald to gather a pro lacrosse team for a four-club league on the Pacific Coast. 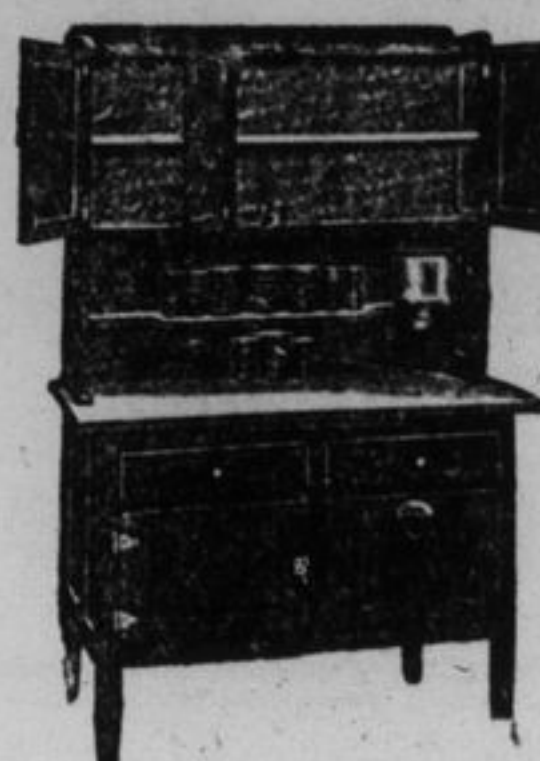
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
