The management of Kingston Collegiate basketball team is trying to make arrangements for a couple of exhibition games. The team will go to Belleville on Friday, January 23rd. It is expected that the management of the Ottawa basketball team will be able to come to the city and play an exhibition game. The Ogdensburg team, which played an exhibition game in Kingston about three weeks ago, will likely be brought back for another game.

Queen's vs. Frontenac.
One of the fastest hockey games of the month is staged for the evening at the rink this evening, when Frontenac and Queen's intermediates are matched. The Frontenac players are all tried out men, while it is not known who will figure on the Queen's line up. It is very likely that Frontenac's forward line will be composed of "Joe" Smith, "Jimmie" Stewart and Brown. Last year Brown played on the defence. It is not known who will compose the defence, but it is certain that Toban will be in the nets. Queen's team will likely be about the same team as the one which played in Belleville, this week.

Team to Withdraw.
At a meeting of the executive of the S.S.A.A.A., called for Saturday afternoon, the matter of rearranging the senior schedule will be considered. All the games in the first half of the schedule will be completed in a week's time, so the second half will have to be arranged. It is understood that one of the teams, which played in the first half of the schedule, will ask permission to withdraw, as it finds difficulty in getting enough players together.

Juvenile Hockey League.
In the senior juvenile city hockey league game, played on Thursday evening, the team representing Regiopolis College defeated St. Patrick's by a score of 5 to 0. Only two periods were played. At half time the score stood 3 to 0.
The teams competing in this league are experiencing a great deal of difficulty in getting ice to play the games.
Object to League Ruling.
"The City Hockey League rule, which prohibits a player in that league from competing in the O.H.A. games, does not tend to boost hockey," was the statement of one of the representatives of the Frontenac Hockey Club on Friday morning. The members of the Frontenac Club believe that the city league was originally organized for training players for the senior league, such as the O.H.A. series. Boys would learn to play hockey in the city

Queen's Loses Good Player.
It was learned on Friday morning that Smith, the crack defence player, of Queen's intermediates hockey team, had definitely decided to retire from the game. His reasons for this action are that he feels that he cannot continue his studies and also compete in the hockey. His retirement from the game means a great loss to Queen's, as he was one of the most promising athletes registered at the university at the present time. Many at the university feel that more encouragement should be given to the students who participate in the intercollegiate sports. It is impossible for these students to put as much time on their studies as other students who do not take any interest whatever in sports.

PLACED UNDER HEAVY GUARD
New York, Jan. 14.—Public buildings, churches, public utility plants and homes of wealthy citizens here were under heavy guard to-day, by order of the police as a precautionary measure against possible radical demonstrations. Officials were extremely reticent concerning the order, given verbally last night to the entire force, but they intimated it was prompted by federal authority.

Raoul Peret Forming New French Ministry
Paris, Jan. 14.—Raoul Peret, president of the chamber of deputies, was today asked by President Millerand to form a cabinet in succession to the one headed by Georges Leygues, which resigned on Wednesday. M. Peret accepted the task, and immediately began consultations with his friends over the formation of a ministry. He was expected to return to the presidential residence by six o'clock this morning to report on the outcome of his efforts.
Sergt-Major MacNamara, the Labor M.P.P. for Riverdale, will not move to the opposition side of the legislature with M. M. MacBride, of Brantford. He says that he is not particular where he sits so long as he can express his views.
