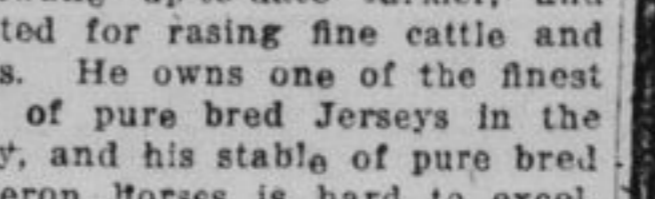
To Have a Good President.
