LEAVING PRINCE ALBERT, GETS AWAY TO GOOD START

E. A. Moore, a Kingston Boy, Has Been Transferred to Thorold, Ont. Kingston Company of Frontenac Regiment Already Has 25 Members.

The Herald, Prince Albert, Sask. E. A. Moore, manager of the local branch of the Bank of Montreal in the city, and Mrs. Moore leave the city to-morrow evening for Thorold, Ontario, to which branch of the bank Mr. Moore has received notice of his transfer as manager.

Mr. Moore came to Prince Albert in February, 1913, and opened the first branch of the Bank of Montreal to be established in this city. He has taken an active part in the public life of the community, his sound judgment and agreeable manner always commanding the greatest confidence and respect, a personal asset that was not unappreciated by the institution which he represented.

For the past year he has been the vice-president of the board of trade during a period which has probably been the most effective in the history of that body, and to his endeavors much of this success is attributable. He is also a member of the public library board, a director of St. Alban's Ladies' College, a member of the executive council for the Diocese of Saskatchewan, of which body he is also a member of the finance and standing committees. He has also been an active worker upon the Boys' Life Council in the city.

Mrs. Moore has been prominent in the social life of the city, and took a keen interest in the Prince Albert tennis club. She will be missed by a large circle of friends. The removal of Mr. and Mrs. Moore from the city will be regretted by a wide circle of friends, to whom they have endeared themselves during their residence in Prince Albert.

In speaking of his departure to a reporter for the Herald, Mr. Moore said that he had been here for eight years and had made many warm and valued friendships during his stay, and he would leave the city with the keenest regret. For the future of Prince Albert he thought the prospects were of the brightest, but whether the full value of the opportunities presented to the city would be realized depended largely upon the earnestness of the co-operation of every citizen.

Mr. Moore was only definitely notified of his transfer yesterday. His successor, Mr. Colville, is a returned officer, who saw considerable service in France with the 13th Battalion and the Canadian Trench Corps.

Mr. and Mrs. Moore are former Kingstonians, the latter a daughter of R. Waldron, Barris street.

TO OPEN ANOTHER PAVILION

At Mowat Hospital to Accommodate Additional Patients Coming Here.

Owing to the increase in "the population" at the Mowat sanatorium, another pavilion is to be opened up shortly. Twenty-eight patients are expected in the course of a few days from St. Agathe, Quebec. Seven patients arrived from Toronto on Wednesday. The nursing staff has been increased by two, and probably another doctor will be added in the near future. Pavilion No. 1 has been recently renovated, and extra heating installed. On arrival of these extra patients the sanatorium will be practically filled to its capacity.

At the present time, Mowat sanatorium is one of the most completely equipped institutions of its kind in Canada. This is due chiefly to the administration of Dr. Bruce Hopkins, the medical superintendent, and his staff, who have always received the heartiest co-operation from the local headquarters of the D. S. C. R. and Ottawa.

Crown Forces Charged. London, Jan. 20.—Crown forces are charged with the burning of public buildings and stores in Cork and the ensuing looting on the night of December 11th and 12th, in a report issued by the Irish labor party and the trades union congress through the British labor party.

The Kingston company of the Frontenac Regiment got away to a good start on Wednesday. At the first parade called, there were present twenty-five of all ranks. Major F. W. Partridge, O.C., was greatly pleased to meet such a fine lot of chaps, and in a brief address outlined the interesting programme of drill, sports and games. He explained the position of the Frontenac Regiment, and of the organization of companies at outside points, all of which were practically independent units. A good spirit is shown in the rank and file, and from the present prospects the complement will be made up in short time.

An interesting feature of the work of this command will be the development of athletic superiority. Sergt. Jarvis, professional boxing trainer, will undertake to produce an athletic platoon out of the entire company, and for this purpose special parades will be held once or twice a week for physical training, boxing and wrestling, as well as basketball and other games.

Major W. J. McManus, G.S.O., M.D. No. 3, was present and expressed great satisfaction with the parade, and promised, on behalf of headquarters, every assistance in the work of the unit. He told of what was being done in raising the other companies, particularly at Napanee, and it was likely that as the training advanced opportunities would be presented for competitions between the different companies. Napanee looked like a keen competitor.

The officers present were Major Partridge, Capt. Robinson, Lieut. Forster and Murray.

SENT UP FOR TRIAL ON CHARGE OF ARSON

Albert Doupe Before Police Magistrate at Napanee on Wednesday.

Albert Doupe, arrested a few days ago, on a charge of arson, in connection with the burning of Stanley McKeown's barn near Centreville, on Christmas day, came before Magistrate Rankin, at Napanee, on Wednesday afternoon, and was committed for trial. He was allowed out on \$5,000 bail.

Five witnesses gave evidence concerning the movement of the accused on the day in question. Over three hours were taken up in the hearing. Evidence was given regarding the prisoner being intoxicated and driving around in a rig, and after hearing all the witnesses, Magistrate Rankin considered there was sufficient evidence to put him on his trial.

Doupe was placed under arrest following an investigation which was carried out by Provincial Fire Marshal Bishop.

CONSTABLE BRIANT HAD A VERY CLOSE CALL

Was Victim of Runaway Accident Near Enterprise on Tuesday.

High Constable Briant, Camden East, had a narrow escape from being killed on Tuesday afternoon, when he was the victim of a runaway accident. He was driving near Enterprise, when the horse took fright at a tractor alongside the road, and bolted. Constable Briant was thrown out, and his head struck against the tractor. He suffered severe cuts about the head, but luckily none were of a serious nature, and it is expected that he will be able to be around again in the course of a few days. Constable Briant was driving alone at the time.

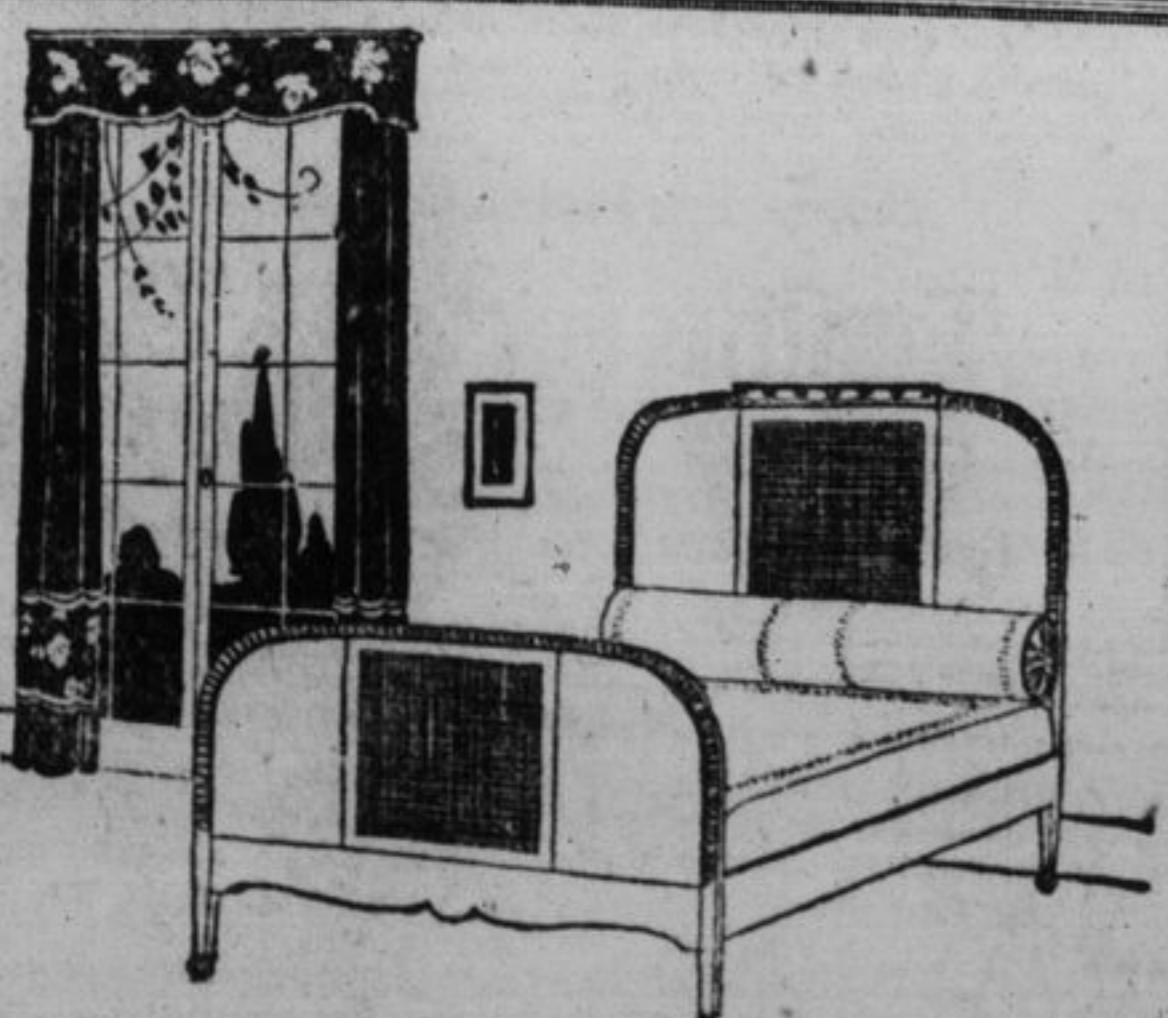
