Poultry were not nearly so plentiful, and as a result hit the high spots in prices. The mild weather gave the farmers and gardeners a chance to bring in a lot of the perishable fruits, and vegetables which they could not handle easily in a zero temperature, and a merry trade went on in apples, celery and other greens.

**HOME AND SCHOOL CLUB**

of Victoria School Addressed by Prof. W. T. McClement.

The Victoria Home and School club met in the school on Friday evening, the president, Mrs. L. T. Best in the chair. Mrs. Day, secretary, presented the usual reports. Invitations had been sent to members of the Board of Education and their wives, and a large number were present. The club was fortunate in securing Professor W. T. McClement to give an illustrated address on "The Canadian Beaver." With the aid of the school lantern many interesting views of this animal were shown, among them the first portrait of a beaver ever taken. The speaker stated that last year some six hundred beavers were killed for food. No matter what damage is done by beavers, the farmers are not allowed to kill them, but the damage is made good by the government.

A vote of thanks to Prof. McClement was moved by Mrs. R. J. Wilson, seconded by Mrs. Matheson, and adopted. Other speakers were Inspector J. R. Stuart, Principal Estinger, and Allan Lemmon, chairman of the Board of Education. Refreshments were served at the close of the meeting.
