Poland is reviving its tobacco culture with excellent results.

An electric light attachment for safety razors has been invented.

Several planters in Sumatra are experimenting with camphor cultivation.

Sausage casings have been invented which are made of wood pulp cellulose.

Norwegian experimenters are trying to drive automobiles with acetylene gas.

The magnification is adjustable in a telescopic rifle sight invented in Europe.

Both ends of steel pins are counter-sunk at the same time with a new drilling machine.

New Zealand has 4,391 registered apiaries, representing more than 50,000 colonies of bees.

Operated by clockwork, a new toy figure of a man swims realistically, using an overhead stroke.

An Hydroelectric plant of 20,000 horsepower has been completed in France to supply power to Lyon.

Among the household novelties is a porous covered dish which keeps its contents cool by evaporation.

Invented in England is a woman's vanity bag which ejects a shoe shining pad when a spring is pressed.

To enable babies to sleep safely out of doors a wagon which can be completely closed has been patented.

To help solve its fuel problem the government of Brazil is encouraging the planting of eucalyptus trees.

A new word counter for typewriters is mounted on one end of the space bar, being operated as the bar is depressed.

Experiments in England indicate that fish dried in electrically heated air can be kept in good condition for years.

A woman is the patentee of a cook book in which each recipe is illustrated by pictures of the ingredients to be used.

An electro-magnet instrument has been invented by a French specialist to test a person's memory and power of attention.

An aerial mail service to carry overseas letters arriving at Cape Town to three other cities in South Africa is planned.

Operated by compressed air a brace has been invented to help hold a riveting tool inside boilers and other hollow structures.

Australians are experimenting with a mammoth oil driven harvester which strips grain fields at a rate of about 60 acres a day.

An extra long plug has been invented for insertion in electric light sockets carrying shades too small to admit a person's hand.

Simple enough for a blind workman to operate safely is a French inventor's machine for rapidly trimming the bristles of brushes.

Rubber bands with thick, rough threads have been invented by a man living in Washington, D.C., to serve the purpose of overshoes.

An inventor in Czechoslovakia has patented a process for making an imitation cork from turf for insulation and building purposes.

A Louisiana man is the inventor of a tool for wrecking walls and ceilings of buildings without requiring scaffolding to be erected.

Agricultural stations, especially for the education of orphans and abandoned children, will be established by the government of Brazil.

An old open style street car in Boston has been equipped as a double deck ambulance for removing large numbers of patients to a hospital.

Almost every known gem is mined in Australia, New South Wales leading the other states in value and variety of precious stones produced.

Finland has been officially estimated to have 1,160,000 horsepower available in its streams, of which only 150,000 horsepower is being utilized.

An automatic switch has been designed that turns on an automobile lights at a designated time irrespective of the presence of the owner of a car.

Experiments by British scientists have developed a way to freeze beef so as to prevent completely the physical and chemical properties of the fresh meat.

A small but powerful reflector backed electric lamp has been designed for use instead of flash light powder when photographs are taken in dimly lighted rooms.

Jewelry resembling gold and non-tarnishing domestic utensils are being made in France of an alloy invented by a chemist containing 90 per cent. of copper and ten of aluminum.

corkscrew mounted at one end of a handle, from the other end of which project beaded wires to extract corks that have been pushed into bottles.

Invented by an English aviator, glass panels that slide into the body of an automobile enable a car to be converted from one of the open type into a limousine in about one minute.

A motor truck designed for use on narrow roads is equipped with a horizontal fifth wheel under the centre of the body, which serves as a turntable when the truck is lifted by jacks.

Experts have been conducting successful experiments in the manufacture of paper pulp from latag grass, which grows profusely in Queensland and is similar to the Spanish esparto.

Barriers, extending along the ground from one or both sides of a recently patented roadway gate enable an automobilist to open or close the gate merely by running his car over them.

A railroad crossing gate invented in Germany consists of a metal tube carrying an acetylene light in its centre that is automatically illuminated at night when the gate is lowered.

More economical of power than the usual electric drink mixers that have a motor for each stirring spindle is one invented by an Indiana man in which a single motor drives all the spindles.

So thin is the material with which a four feet high tent invented in England is made that it can be folded and carried in a coat pocket, the pole also folding and serving as a walking stick.

To clear some Wisconsin lakes of vegetation so that clear ice can be harvested a motor boat has been equipped with a reaper and machinery that binds the rushes into bundles for use as fuel.

A German monoplane for commercial purposes can be dismantled and packed in a railroad car for shipment in fifteen minutes being braced by trusses instead of wires.

To make automobiles distinctive a New York inventor has patented a process for producing designs or initials on their radiators by partially expanding certain of the cells after they are assembled.

A British Board of Trade committee has reported that there are nine sources of water power in one portion of Scotland alone capable of generating a continuous supply of 133,500 electrical horsepower.

By coating the inside of an opal electric light globe with red dye a Baltimore official found that it would appear white in daytime, but show a red light as a danger signal when the current was turned on.

The government will rebuild many railroad bridges in Greece with steel or concrete to permit the use of American locomotives that were imported several years ago, but found too heavy for the present structures.

Three new dyes have been discovered by a North Carolina dentist, one coloring silk a champagne hue and wool a tan shade, another making silk purple and wool, a gold color and the third producing bronze tints.

After futile efforts extending over several years engineers have succeeded in boring to a depth of 150 feet in the famous Trinidad asphalt lake and have found its contents of uniform character all the way down.

Containing that two small electric fans are more efficient than one large one, an inventor has mounted a pair on separate arms from a common pedestal, at different heights and separately adjustable as to angle.

Because 90 per cent. of the world's supply of cinchona bark, from which quinine is derived, is grown in Java, searching for other sources of supply in Great Britain's colonies.

Believing that cattle will not break through even a light wire fence if a single strand of barbed wire be extended in front of it, an inventor has patented a bracket to hold the latter and swing it to either side desired.

Do You Know?

That the first European ruler to drive his own motor car was the King of Italy.

That motor car owners in the United States are spending from \$75,000,000 to \$100,000,000 a month for current "upkeep."

That lead-free zinc oxide forms one-half of the compound of many automobile tires.

That close to 350,000 motor vehicles are in operation throughout the Dominion of Canada.

That in Belgium motor tractors are towing canal boats of 350 to 400 tons from Liege to Antwerp. The distance of ninety-five miles is made in five or six days.

That farmers in the United States owned 2,366,475 passenger automobiles last year.

That American motor car owners are paying from \$1,800,000,000 to \$2,400,000,000 annually for operating maintenance and depreciation costs.

That of the 39,000 motor vehicles controlled by the Motor Transport Corps of the U.S. army, disposition of ninety-eight per cent., or 38,048 vehicles, was made up to April 8th.

That Canada manufactured more than 94,000,000 motor vehicles during 1919.

That employed for short-haul delivery in large quantities of milk, eggs and other perishable foods, motor trucks are most popular around the big cities.

That before a chauffeur's license will be issued in Cleveland, O., a new tariff ordinance provides for the taking of finger prints of the applicant.

Under a new process iron is coated with copper by painting it with a varnish made of pulverized copper and copper oxide in crude oil, then subjected to heat, which volatilizes the oil, reduces the oxide and fuses the metallic copper to the iron.

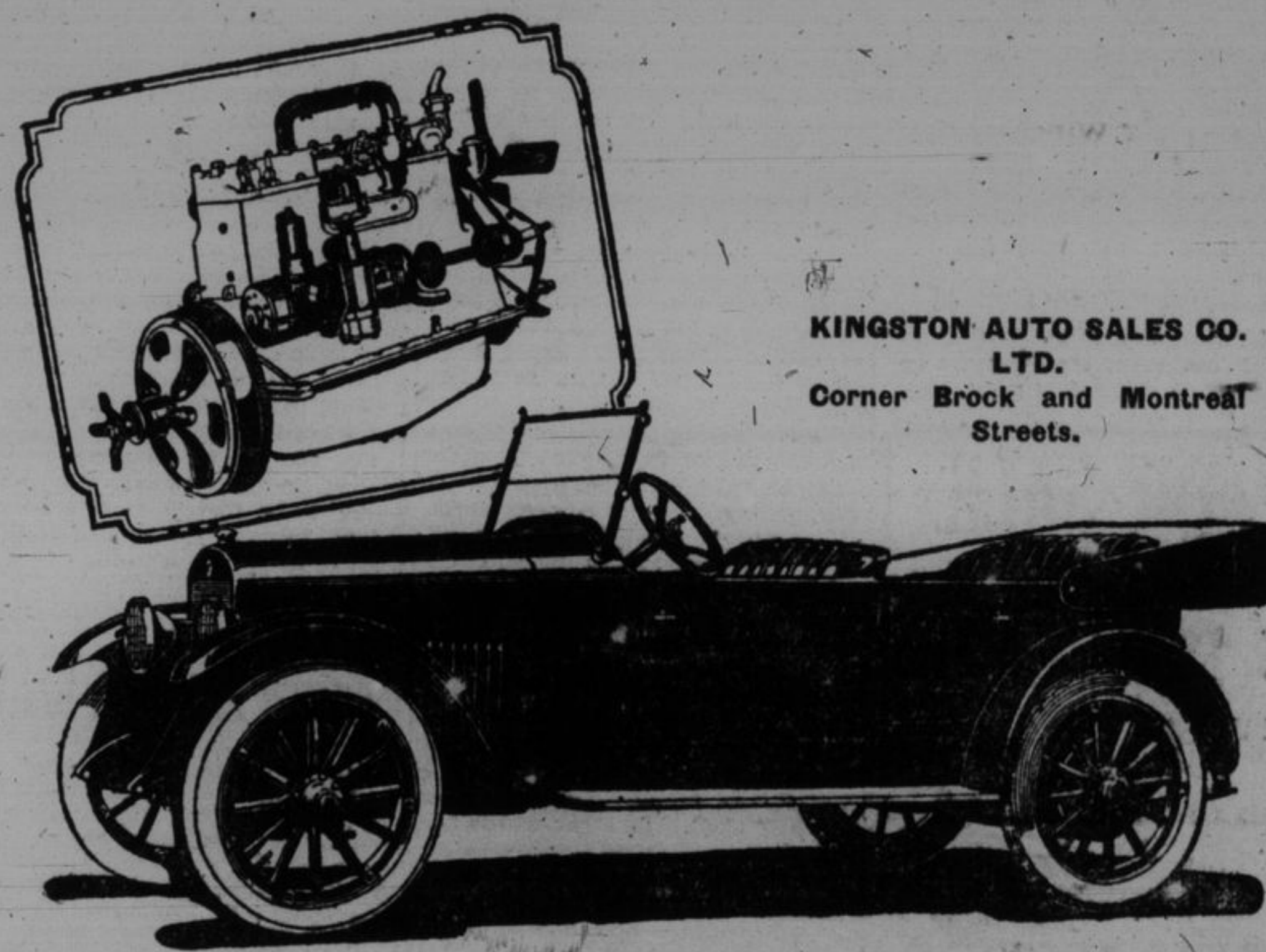

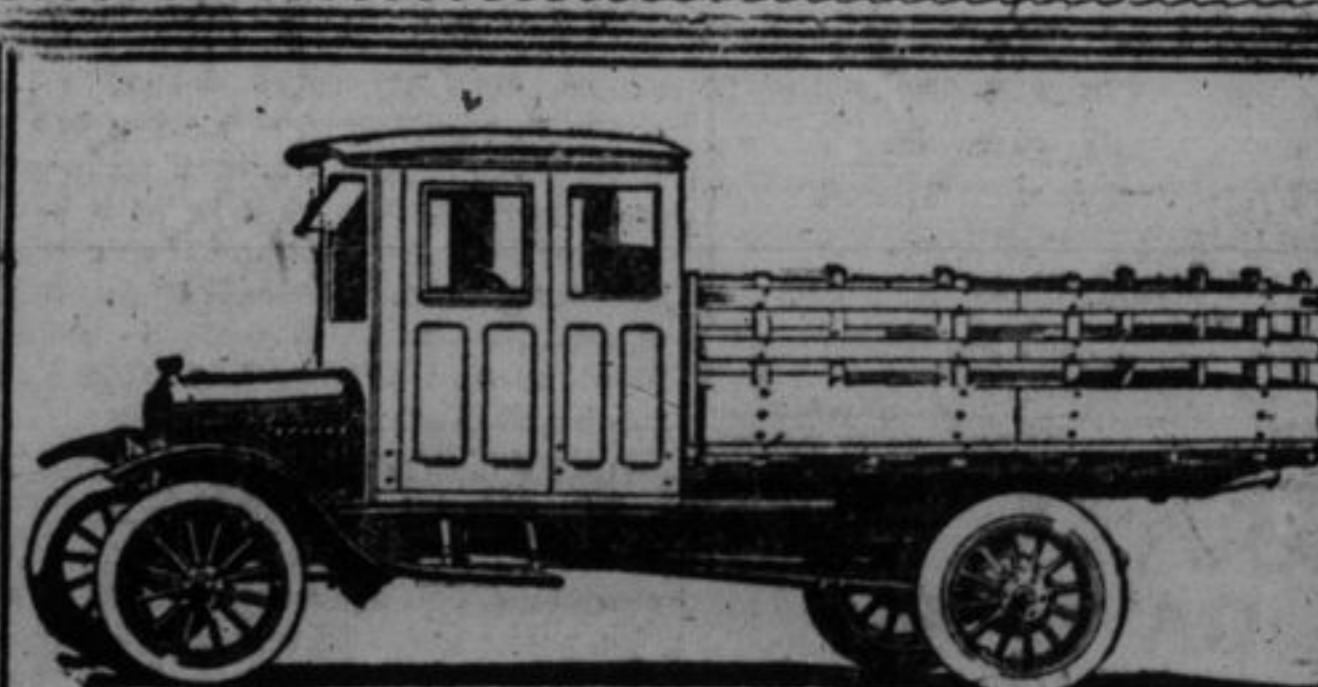
