Township Councils

STORRINGTON. Sunbury, Jan. 10.—The newly elected council of the township of Storrington met at 11 a.m. Those making a declaration of office required by law are composed of the following: Reeve, John Taylor; councillors, Martin Sands, William Lindsay, Bert Bails and George McFarlane.

The minutes of last meeting read, and, on motion Sands-Balls, adopted. At 12 a.m. the reeve adjourned the meeting for dinner, to meet again at 1 p.m.

The clerk, Samuel Jamieson, read his resignation, to take effect immediately, and, on motion McFarlane-Sands, it was accepted.

Applications were read for office of assessor from William Traves, George Kirkpatrick and A. N. McCullum. On motion Sands-McFarlane, A. N. McCullum was appointed assessor for 1921, at a salary of \$70.

Moved, McFarlane-Balls, and resolved, that Charles Sleeth be appointed member for Board of Health, and Maynard Campbell be appointed sanitary inspector.

On motion, Lindsay-Sands, resolved that the sheep valuers be R. Lucy, C. Barr, Kora Darling and Thomas Anderson, and that Standard Publishing Company be paid \$18.32 for printing. Moved, Lindsay-Balls, that Alfred Snider be refunded \$3 dog tax and drop the sheep claim.

On motion, Sands-McFarlane, resolved that James McIlroy be paid \$5 for one sheep killed by dogs. On motion, Lindsay-Sands, it was resolved that Marshall Cochrane be paid \$18 for casting for James Simpson's engine, that Whig Publishing Company be paid \$101.15 on bills dated from July 10th to Dec. 18th, 1919; that Robert Lucy be paid \$14. Kora Darling \$16 and Lorne Campbell \$16 for election expenses.

On motion, Balls-McFarlane, resolved to pay the bill of \$11.65 to George Ritchie for caretaker and expenses; that James E. Donnelly be refunded \$3 statute labor, as he has no road; that the minutes of meeting be published in the Kingston papers by clerk, and that the council meet at Sunbury for 1921.

On motion, Balls-Lindsay, resolved that ex-Reeve McFadden, Thomas Makin and Mr. Silver each receive \$5 for two trips to Kingston regarding the settlement with W. F. Nickle, barrister, for gravel from Mr. Sloan.

Moved, Sands-Lindsay, and resolved, that the Deannee be paid \$16 for election expenses; that \$4.99 be paid H. Purdy for the R.D. No. 28; that John McBride be paid \$15 for rent and coal oil for heat and light from June 21st to Dec. 31st, 1920; that the reeve be appointed to see about having the books of the township properly audited; that W. F. Nickle be paid \$54.60 for gravel on R.D. No. 1 from S. Sloan's pit, and that A. Sharp be authorized to employ someone to make a small door in the scale house at Sunbury.

At 3.30 p.m. the council adjourned, to meet next at the call of the Reeve. —HAROLD W. SLEETH, clerk.

OBITUARY

Clark Hulson Moxley. Clark Hulson Moxley, oldest son of Mrs. Robert Moxley, Brockville, and of the late Robert Moxley, died Saturday at his mother's residence, after a long illness, aged 49 years.

The late Mr. Moxley was born in the township of Escott and from 1905 until he was taken ill three years ago was a travelling representative of the E. B. Eddy Co., with headquarters in Montreal. The deceased was well and favorably known among the general public with whom he came in contact in the course of his business pursuits, as well as citizens in general, and much sorrow is felt at his passing.

Besides his mother, a brother Keith Moxley, Brockville, also survives. He was a member of the Methodist church and of the Brockville Commercial Travellers' Association.

The Late W. J. Lannigan. Ex-Private Walter John Lannigan, aged twenty-four years, passed away at the Sydenham Hospital on Friday. The deceased was born at Newark, N.J., and served in the C.E.F. during the war. He is survived by his wife and two children.

The funeral took place from the residence of his brother-in-law, 15 Pine street, at Cataract cemetery, on Monday, with full military honors. Lt.-Col. the Rev. Alexander Gordon, senior chaplain M.D. No. 3, officiated, and John Cornelius, undertaker, was in charge of the funeral.

The Late John Jenkins. John Jenkins, one of Kingston's most widely known and highly respected contractors, passed away on Monday morning at his residence, 373 Princess street. The deceased was born in England, and was seventy-five years of age. Coming to Canada at an early age, he was prominently identified with the growth of the city of Kingston, and as a contractor, was known for his integrity and industry.
