FRONTENAC'S NEW WARDEN

Reeve Charles MacGregor, of Barrie Township, Unanimously Chosen.

Charles MacGregor, reeve of the township of Barrie, is the new warden of Frontenac county. He was unanimously elected to that position at the inaugural meeting of the county council on Tuesday afternoon. When the council convened at four o'clock, it was moved by Reeve Clarke, Kingston township, and seconded by Reeve Taylor, Storrington township, that Mr. MacGregor be appointed warden, and the resolution was adopted. Warden-elect MacGregor thanked his colleagues for the honor they had conferred upon his township and himself by electing him to the highest office in the gift of Frontenac. It was the first time that a reeve from Barrie had ever been chosen as warden, and therefore he regarded his appointment for 1921 as a special honor. He promised to work continually in the interests of the people of the county.

On motion of Councillors Halliday and Hamilton, the following were appointed to select the standing committees for the year and report at ten o'clock Wednesday morning: Councillors Halliday, Sills, Drew, Dennison, Clarke, Hamilton and Gemmill. Both Councillors Halliday and Hamilton congratulated Warden MacGregor upon his elevation, and promised to co-operate with him in every way possible.

From W. H. Morris, secretary of the Trustees Association, regarding appointment of delegates to attend meeting of association to be held in Toronto on March 29th to 31st.

From H. B. Carralesch, secretary Tamworth continuation school, account of \$64.10 for tuition of Frontenac pupils for school year preceding Dec. 30th, 1920.

From F. C. Biggs, minister of public works and highways, with reference to amendments to Section 460 of the Municipal Act with respect to the question of civil liability with regard to traffic on municipal roads, and question of claims presented to townships and counties for accidents to automobiles and other vehicles on the public roads, as amounts paid in settlement are in many cases a heavy drain upon municipal resources.

From W. F. Nickle, county solicitor, asking to meet committee of council regarding hearing before the Municipal and Railway Board, about Frontenac vs. Townships of Kingston and Pittsburg. The date for the hearing will shortly be set, and it will be necessary for the county to produce witnesses and make clear by way of evidence the reasons for their objections to be saddled with the expense of certain road construction.

The Standing Committees.

At the session of council on Wednesday morning the following standing committees, recommended in the report of the select committees, were appointed on motion of Councillors Drew and Hamilton:

A representative of the Navy League of Canada addressed the council in support of the league's request for a grant of \$2,000.

Warden-elect MacGregor.

Charles MacGregor, warden of Frontenac, was born near Springfield, Mass., but has lived in Barrie township most of his life. He comes of Scottish parentage as his name tells. He has been one of the leading farmers of Barrie township, which contains many Scottish settlers. Mr. MacGregor is very much gratified upon being chosen warden on the anniversary of Burns' day. He is a Presbyterian in religion, and his lodge affiliations are with the Masons, the Oddfellows and the Orange order. For the past twenty-five years, Mr. MacGregor has been identified with municipal politics. He entered the county council in 1907 and has been a member of that body for eight years. He is one of the most popular members of the Frontenac council. The township of Barrie, which he represents, is one of the smallest of the county townships, but like little Scotland it has produced

some able men. Warden MacGregor's postoffice address is Myer's Cave.

SHOOTING COMPETITIONS

Smith's Falls Collegiate Team Takes Highest Place.

In the shooting competitions for the Imperial challenge shield in 1920, the Smith's Falls Collegiate Institute team captured the highest place among the Canadian cadet corps taking part in the competitions, and carried off the governor-general's trophy. Last year this trophy was won by the Kingston Collegiate Institute. The cup will be presented by the governor-general himself, who is arranging a date for his visit to Smith's Falls. In addition to the trophy, each member of the shooting team won two pounds. This competition is an Imperial event and teams from every part of the empire took part. The record of the other teams in M. D. No. 3 was as follows: Kingston Collegiate, 64th; Hawkesbury high school cadets, 139th; Vankleek Hill, 256th; Millbrook high school, 272nd; Arnprior high school, 349th. In the junior competition the Millbrook school came 246th.

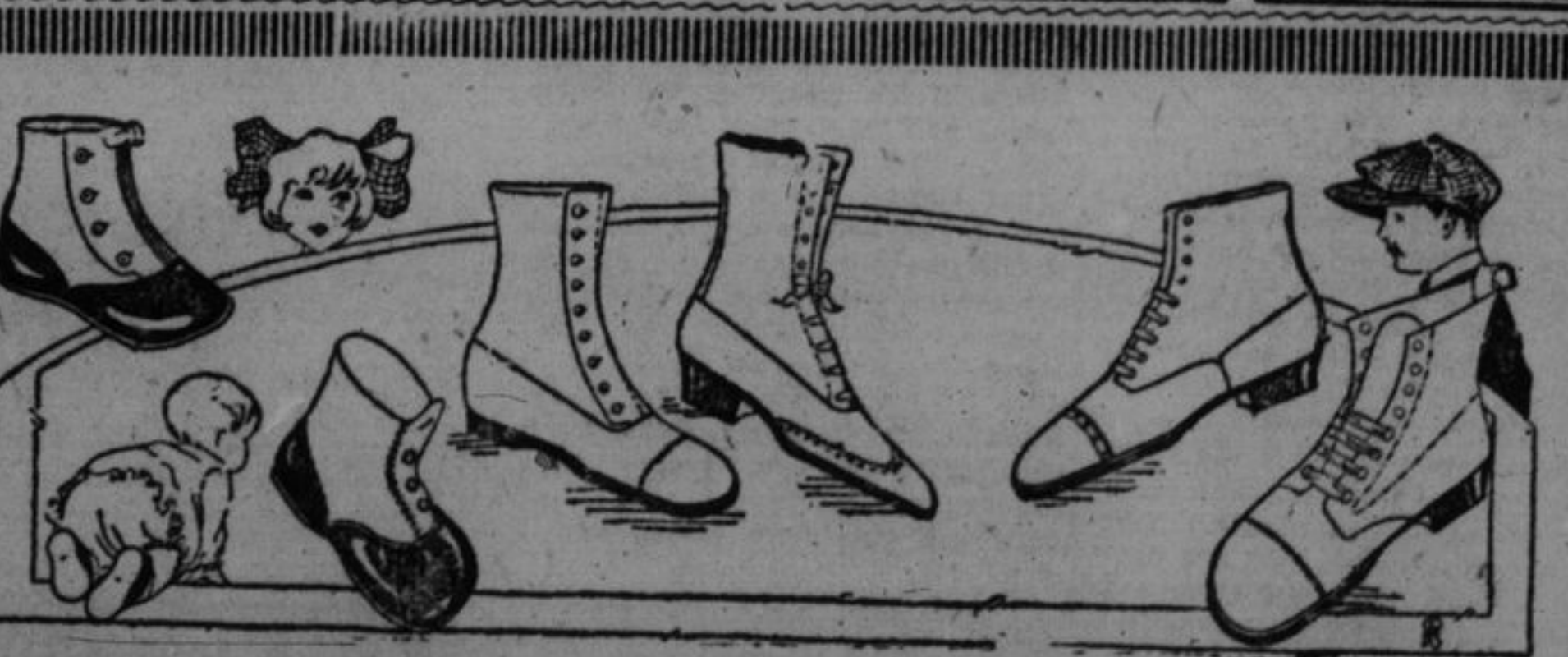
