Toronto, Jan. 27-Sir Henry Drayon, minister of finance, told the de" legates to the Canadian Shoe Manufacturers' convention last night that the manufacturers themselves were not without blame for the present trade depression in Canada. Adding hat the pyramiding of prices had to stop and that the luxury tax imposed had been of some effect, he stated hat Canada imported last year \$60,-000,000 of goods which were either luxuries or made of materials that could be produced in this country.

It was not possible, he said, for the government to altogether stop imrts, but when Canadian factories the new "Quebec Liquor Act. were without work he wondered why people did it.

"I wonder, gentlemen," he added, pressing the point, "whether the manufacturers of this country are no. to blame. So far as your product is concerned you are not to blame. You wint to sell your product. But have you ever bought American automobiles or American trucks? Have you ever bought American tires? I wonder if you are buying yourselves 100 per cent. Canadian products?"


