To Go Into Winter Dairying.

A number of farmers in Lennox and Addington are planning to go into winter dairying next year.

Made Much Butter. The Napanee branch of the Belleville Creamery made 211,000 lbs. of butter during 1920, an increase of 55,000 lbs. over the output of the preceding year.

Banks Are Closed. After a run of about a year and a half at Burritt's Rapids, the Royal and Union Banks have withdrawn from there, and now the Rapids people will go to Merrickville to do their banking in the same banks.

Nearly Severed a Toe. Councillor Aug. Woernke, Pembroke, nearly lost the small toe of his right foot on Thursday last. An axe fell off a box in an outbuilding which he was working and the sharp blade struck his foot, nearly severing the toe.

Dr. Anderson Re-Elected. The Smith's Falls board of education held its first meeting of the year a few days ago, with a full attendance of members. The secretary, Mrs. J. McEwen, called upon the board to elect a chairman and Dr. Anderson went back to the chair by acclamation.

Health Officer. The Belleville Board of Health sent to the council a recommendation that Dr. S. G. Cronk be appointed health officer pro tem, owing to Dr. Yeomans' illness, and that the latter be granted three months' leave of absence. The recommendation was approved.

Copeland-Wiltshire Wedding. A quiet but pretty wedding took place Jan. 8th, when Rev. R. S. E. Large, Thorold, joined in matrimony James Edward Copeland, Thorold, and Mrs. Maggie May Wiltshire, Toronto, formerly of Napanee. The bride was dressed in a pretty amethyst silk dress and attended by Mrs. R. S. Large, while Herbert Molesley

supported the groom. The happy couple will reside in Thorold.

George Webber Arrested. George Webber, Cape Vincent, N.Y., a cattle buyer, was arrested on Saturday on a warrant charging him with assault in the third degree. It is charged that Webber assaulted Oliver P. O'Hara, another cattle buyer, at the Crowner House yards, in Watertown, N.Y., on Saturday afternoon.

Good Rink at Barriefield. The members of the Barriefield hockey club are to be congratulated on the excellent rink which they have built in the quarry on Barriefield heights. There is an excellent ice surface and good dressing rooms are provided. The ice surface is enclosed.

Crack In The Ice. A resident of Wolfe Island, who came to the city on Wednesday, stated that the ice in the harbor was in bad shape in places. He said that while driving over from the island his horse's front feet went through a crack. At one place he had to go half a mile out of his way to get across a large crack.

A Popular Mayor. On Thursday, Jan. 20th, Jesse Funnell, esq., mayor of Trenton, celebrated the seventy-first anniversary of his birthday. Not many of Mayor Funnell's numerous friends realize that Trenton's magistrate has had that high honor bestowed upon him by his fellow citizens, as many as nine times, seven by acclamation.

The Car Started Off. On Wednesday afternoon a young man learned that it was foolish to crank a car unless first looking to see if the engine was in gear. He cranked his automobile and in less time than it takes to tell the tale, the car started up the street and before it was stopped it crashed into the electric light pole and broke all the fenders on the right hand side.

Occupy Similar Posts. Twenty-five years ago the firm of Wilgress & Healy were proprietors of the Brockville Times. Both have since entered the services of Provincial governments and each now holds an identically similar position in two provinces. W. J. Healy having a short time ago been appointed provincial librarian of Manitoba and A. T. Wilgress a few days ago having been transferred from the post of king's printer of Ontario to that of provincial librarian.

Successful Auction. Last Wednesday a most successful auction sale was held on the farm of Joseph Bateman, three miles west of Tweed, which netted over \$5,000. Cows averaged \$75.25, one pure bred Holstein selling for \$150. A six-year-old bull calf brought \$101 and a three-year-old colt \$167. A pre-bred mare was knocked down for \$150, and a pair of eyes for \$90 each. Hay sold for \$27 and oats seventy-seven cents. A record crowd attended the sale and the weather was splendid.

Surprised Their Friends. Allan MacAllen, of the staff of Harwood's jewelry store, Pembroke and Miss Essie Stewart, of the public school teaching staff, second daughter of J. C. Stewart, were married last week in Ottawa and sent back word to their Pembroke friends, creating a little flurry of excitement. Mr. and Mrs. MacAllen are now enjoying a short honeymoon and will likely take up residence at Barrie afterwards, the groom having decided to transfer to that place.
