



YUKON PIONEER DEAD

Andrew Hart Was Also Veteran of Several Wars.

Dawson, Y.T., Jan. 27.-Veteran of the Nile expedition of 1882, the South African War of 1858, the East African campaign and the Great War, Andrew Hart, noted pioneer Yukon miner and Dawson fire chief, died suddenly from heart failure at the age of sixty. He was a native of Cupar, Fifeshire, Scotland.
