MAYOR SAYS HE HAS PLAYED NO FAVORITES

Even Refused His Brother's "I.O.U." to Bail Out Students.

During the milk debate by the city council on Monday night, Mayor Nickle stated that it had been charged in a certain quarter that he had not treated all civic departments alike in the way of "jacking" them up when the question of efficiency was at stake. His worship declared that he had "played no favorites." He had "jacked" up the police force in 1914 and 1915, as the citizens would remember. The police force was an efficient body to-day, and one evidence of this was the fact that last year over \$8,000 in fines had been collected for violations of the law. Mayor Nickle told of the arrest of some students a few months ago, and how an appeal had been made to him very late on a Saturday night to have them released on bail. He had even refused to accept his own brother's "I.O.U." for the bail and another offer of \$170 in cash, as the requirement was \$200 cash. He had shown no favoritism to any person whose he had become chief magistrate and he intended to treat all alike.

Second Battalion Re-union.

A battalion re-union and banquet was held in Bowmanville, on Saturday night, when many reminiscences of days at the front were recalled by speakers. Col. McLaughlin presided. Major-General Macdonnell gave a stirring, straight-forward talk to men on problems of returned soldiers. He also explained why the Canadians were ordered to take Paschendaele. Plans are being made to hold a Second Battalion re-union in Belleville next year on Jan. 30th.
