There are only three cases of smallpox in Picton. The Board of Health has ordered the vaccination of all children attending Picton public school who have not been vaccinated within seven years.

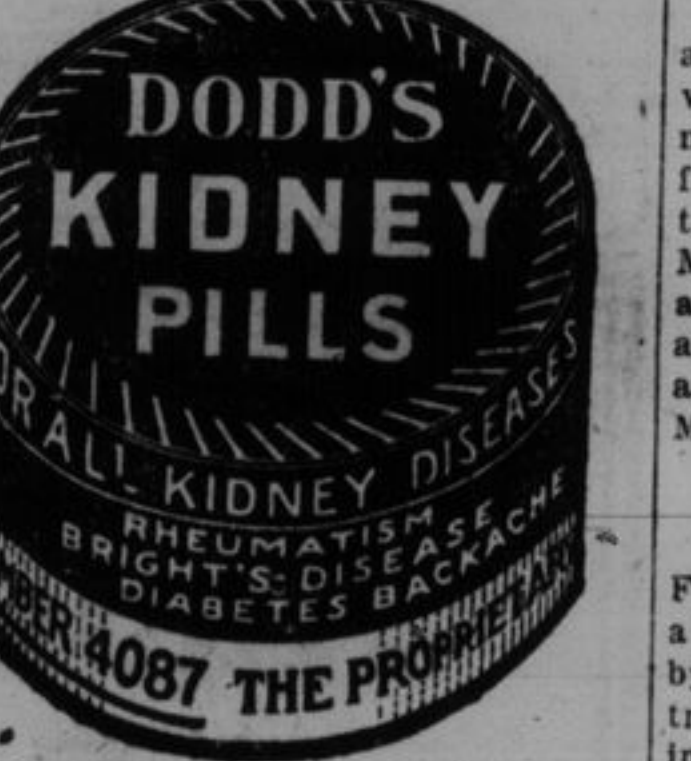
Favors Free Doctoring.
