

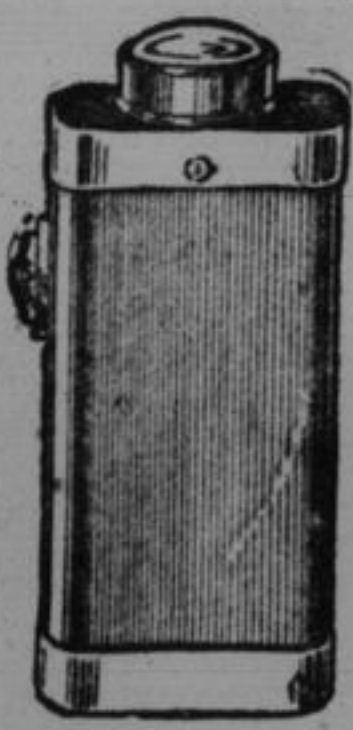

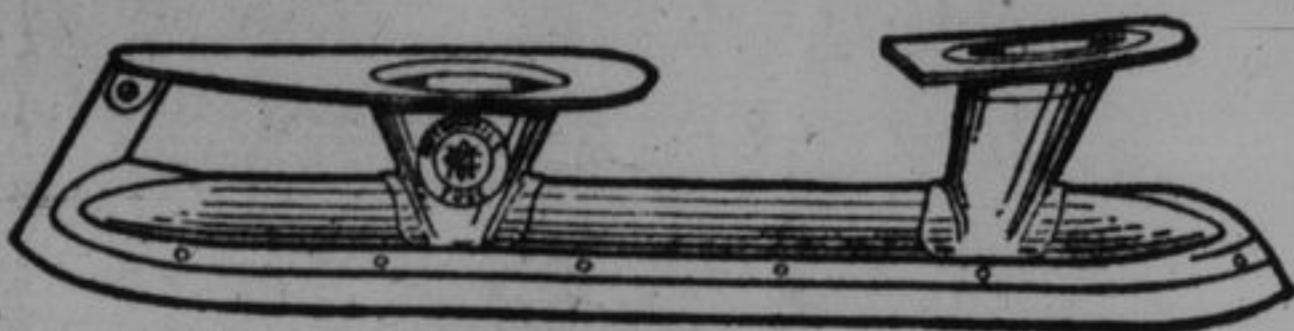

Queen's Win Game But Lose Round To Cornwall Team

Cornwall is winner of the eastern group of the Junior O.H.A. In the final game played at the Covered rink on Monday evening, Queen's won by a score of 4 to 2 but lost the round by one goal. In Cornwall on Thursday evening last, the home team won by a score of 5 to 2.

The score at the end of the first period last night was 2 to 1 in favor of Cornwall, and the second period was 2 to 2 in favor of Queen's. The Cornwall team is a very good aggregation and showed wonderful speed. The players exhibited wonderful ability to bore in on the net, and Quinn saved Queen's shots which looked good.

C. F. Swazee, Brockville, who refereed the game, was anything but satisfactory to the crowd. Decisions which he gave were biased. As a rule, Kingston fans can stand almost anything, but on Monday evening they had to sit and see the Kingston players have it put all over them by the referee. The Queen's men appeared to be benched for things that the Cornwall players are allowed to get away with all the evening. Twice in succession McDonald, of Queen's, was penalized for offences which Cornwall played during the whole game. The Cornwall team showed wonderful ability to carry the puck and out skate the Queen's forwards.

During the first twenty minutes of the game, the Cornwall team seemed to have the best of the argument. Time after time they came down the ice with a three-man combination, and the Queen's defence were able to chase them into the corner. McKelvey, who was playing at centre ice, found difficulty in getting away from the Cornwall, centre player Tilton. Although small, this player develops great speed. Reynolds of Queen's went up the ice at a very fast rate but the Cornwall goaler was right on the job. The game had been underway for ten and one half minutes when Kinghorn passed Quinn from a rebound for the first score of the game. Queen's tried desperately to score but they were out of luck. Don Nickle drew a one minute penalty for a legal body check. From this point of the game, the crowd started to roast the referee.

When Queen's returned to the game after the rest they started to outskate the opposing team, with the result that McDonald tied the score after a nice pass from McKelvey directly in front of the net. Queen's attempted to use their bodies but they saw that the referee would not stand to see the Cornwall team thus checked. McDonald drew two penalties, and when he returned to the ice the Queen's forwards got in some nice work and Gibson counted the second score. One minute later, McCutcheon, of Cornwall, tied the score after a full length rush. With only a couple of minutes to play, McKelvey scored after a pass from the rear of the net.

In the last period it looked as though Queen's could overtake the three-goal lead, but luck was not their way. Both teams worked very hard, but Cornwall resorted to a four-man defence. With one minute to play, McKelvey got the final score from a mix-up in front of the Cornwall net.

For the winners Tilton and Constant were good. The back checking of the team was excellent. McDonald on the Queen's on the wing played a steady game. A number of times this player was boarded.

When the Cornwall team gets in the semi-finals of the league and runs up against teams that will give them some body checking, they may not be able to stand it, as the players are very light.

FANS ARE DISORDERLY WHEN WALES LOSE

Interest in rugby football on Saturday centred in the Wales-Scotland international at Swansea. This was expected to be anybody's match, but Scotland deservedly won by a good margin with a placed goal, a penalty goal and two tries to two dropped goals, or 14 points to 8. This is Scotland's first success in Wales in twenty-nine years.

The match was very unsatisfactory owing to the disorderly behaviour of the spectators, who numbered 30,000. The playing ground was frequently invaded by the crowd and the game stopped, while at one time mounted police were called upon to effect a clearance.
