A VERY ADMIRABLE PLAY

Presented by the Faculty Players in Queen's Convocation Hall.

If a latent idea, that perhaps grave and reverend dons, who daily instruct the youth of Queen's in the deep subjects of arts, science and the classics, might lack the qualities necessary for the satisfactory production of a "merry farce," lurked in the mind of any one in the large audience that filled Convocation hall Monday evening when the curtain rose for the presentation of "The Man Who Married a Dumb Wife" (Anastasia France), by the Faculty Players that idea was quickly dispelled. From the first moment these clever actors had the interest of their hearers with them till the curtain fell in the last act, amid roars of laughter and applause.

Prof. R. O. Joffe, as Master Leonard Botal, the judge, is discovered in the first act by his old friend, Master Adam Funeo, a lawyer, (Dr. J. L. McKee) sad, at the height of his success on the bench, because his beautiful young wife is dumb. Master Funeo suggests the possibility of having her speech restored by a great physician, at the same time hinting that it might be a doubtful advantage. However, the judge sends his secretary, Giles Boisecourtier, (Miss Ester O'Connor) to fetch the great man, who arrives in state, with a surgeon and apothecary to perform the operation upon the dumb lady. This is a very good scene. Dr. L. J. Austin, Prof. Hicks and Conacher, as the three men of skill, were splendid. Dr. Austin being particularly good. Mrs. J. F. Macdonald as Alison, the maid, filled her part excellently. Then in the next act the wife, Catherine, (Mrs. A. H. Hughes), enters most sweet and charming in a 12th century costume of blue satin with the tall head dress and floating veil of the period and she talks, talks, talks, till her husband says he will go mad and climbs to the top of the book shelf to escape. Mrs. Hughes was perfect in her rather difficult part, chattering till he drives her away. The lawyer, who is pleading the cause of an orphan, (Mrs. W. C. Clark) to whom the judge can restore her rights, turns up, and Botal says the doctors must make his wife dumb again; so they are sent for, but declare it is impossible, that the only possible course is for him to become deaf, by the insertion of a white powder into his ears. Then Catherine enters, as he is declaring his hearing is essential to the carrying on of his profession. She begins talking in her sweet incessant way till the judge, who, with a deep groan, says, "Give me the powder," which in a very funny scene, they do, and Catherine, who has been talking to Madlle de Garandiere, the orphan, turns again to her husband with her sweet blandishments, but this time he hears them not, and the look of joy upon his face is most amusing. Then things come to a climax and a general row ensues, and the curtain falls on the disturbed company.

Miss Mildred Jones, as Madame de la Bruine, O. C. Kinnick, who sang to his guitar as the Blind Fiddler, Mrs. Gullfort Reed as the water cress woman, and Principal Dyde as the candleman, were some of the dramatic personae. Mrs. William Goodwin played several much enjoyed piano numbers between the acts. The electric lights went out for several minutes, but the actors were in no wise disconcerted, and posed gracefully under the spot and sang to the music made by the Blind Fiddler upon his guitar.

Broke Through the Ice in the Kingston Harbor

COMMISSION CHECKS THE G.T.R. COUNSEL

Montreal, Feb. 8.—Again this morning, F. H. Phippen, K.C., counsel for the Grand Trunk, tendered evidence as to the physical values of the Grand Trunk and once more the arbitration board rejected it under their previous majority decision. Sir Walter Cassels checked Mr. Phippen as soon as he approached the question of values. The railroad counsel replied that he intended to go on until he was stopped, so as to put it on record that this evidence had been tendered by the Grand Trunk and was refused by the commission. With this he withdrew the witness, and proceeded with his enquiry to get general evidence as to the general condition of Grand Trunk system.

Belgians Use Loan to Buy Argentine Wheat

Washington, Feb. 8.—Bills imposing a tax of three per cent on foreign loans floated in the United States, will be introduced in congress this week. Identical bills will be introduced simultaneously in both house and senate and the authors will urge their immediate passage. The preparation of these bills is the result of the action of Belgians who last week floated a loan of \$30,000,000, and purchased with this money Argentine wheat with a view of forcing down the price of American wheat.

According to information obtained to-day, the usual ease with which this large loan was subscribed was due to an impression that the money was to be spent for American wheat and the unexpected announcement that practically the entire sum had been expended for wheat in the Argentine came as a shock.
