ADVISES GOVERNMENT TO GO TO THE PEOPLE

Montreal Gazette Declares That Time is Ripe for a Test of Strength.

Montreal, Feb. 9.—Under the caption "Why not an appeal," the Montreal Gazette, one of the Neighen government's most influential supporters, urges editorially upon the federal government the advisability of a general election after the supply bill has been proceeded with. The Gazette says in part:

"The bye-elections won by the government mean merely the retention of seats and indicate no new popular confidence, while the contested seats, like East Elgin and West Peterboro, have swung to the opposition, and weakened to that extent the strength of the ministry. . . . It happens that at the moment the time is propitious for an election, save that supplies have not been voted."

"The advice we have to give to the government is to proceed with the supply bill and then permit the electorate to express its preference for parties in order that stable administration and confident policy may be carried on. The situation is now uncertain; the life of the ministry hangs by a thread; and under this circumstance strong and effective administration of affairs is impossible."

LATEST AFTERNOON NEWS

On Friday afternoon the public accounts will be brought down by Hon. Peter Smith, provincial treasurer. It is expected that these will show a deficit of about two million dollars for the past year. On Tuesday next Hon. Mr. Smith will speak on the budget.

The Ontario department of education may eliminate from its authorized reading books for the Ontario public schools, the naval history, "Flag and Fleet," by Colonel William Wood, Quebec city. This work has been criticized as "both inaccurate and insulting."

Hon. Walter Rolfo told a deputation from the Ontario builders' exchange that there would not be any attempt during the present session of the legislature to increase the allowances now made to injured workmen under the provisions of the Workmen's Compensation Act.

Immediate dismissal of J. P. Jackson, superintendent of the Queen Victoria, Niagara Falls park, and an investigation into the administration of P. W. Ellis, chairman of the park commission, is demanded in a petition signed by more than seven hundred residents of Niagara Falls.

BRITISH EMPIRE OFFICE ISSUES A DENIAL

London, Feb. 9.—The foreign office to-day issued a statement declaring to be without foundation the reports published in the United States, Tuesday, to the effect that an official of the foreign office had uttered a warning of increasing seriousness of Anglo-American relations.
