

New York, Feb. 11.-Suffering from nervous depression, Mrs. Marion Peters, wife of Joseph R. Peters, vice-president of the Fairbank Scale Company, threw herself from a window on the eighth floor of the fashionable Belnord apartments at No. 220 West Eighty-seventh street, yes-

terday. Mrs. Peters, who was thirty-two years old, had been ill from grippe and nervous trouble and was under the care of Dr. Sidney H. Adler, of the Belnord. A nurse, Miss Etta J. Davenport, was in charge at three o'clock in the morning. Mrs. Peters, apparently in full possession of her senses and in no worse physical or mental condition than usual, asked the nurse to tell her husband that she would like to say good night .. Miss Davenport tapped on the door of Mr. Peters' room and delivered
