SENDS NURSE AWAY, LEAPS TO HER DEATH

Mrs. Marlon Peters Throws Self From Eighth Story Window of Belnord.

New York, Feb. 11.—Suffering from nervous depression, Mrs. Marlon Peters, wife of Joseph R. Peters, vice-president of the Fairbank Scale Company, threw herself from a window on the eighth floor of the fashionable Belnord apartments at No. 220 West Eighty-seventh street, yesterday.

Mrs. Peters, who was thirty-two years old, had been ill from gripe and nervous trouble and was under the care of Dr. Sidney H. Adler, of the Belnord. A nurse, Miss Etta J. Davenport, was in charge at three o'clock in the morning. Mrs. Peters, apparently in full possession of her senses and in no worse physical or mental condition than usual, asked the nurse to tell her husband that she would like to say good night.

Miss Davenport tapped on the door of Mr. Peters' room and delivered the message.

"All right! I'll be there in a minute," the husband called, and Miss Davenport returned to the invalid's room, to find the bed empty and the curtains flapping at an opened window.
