STORM UPROOTS TIMBER.

\$100,000,000 Worth of Old Trees Wrecks Destroyed.

Port Angeles, Wash., Feb. 10.—Timber valued at nearly \$100,000,000 was uprooted in the storm which swept the Olympic peninsula of Washington between Jan. 20th and 30th. Charles Morgan Roth, assistant federal forest supervisor, estimated after a trip to the district.

Sixty per cent. of the timber can be salvaged with prompt action, Morgan Roth said. He added that some of the trees destroyed were standing 600 years before Columbus discovered America. No loss of life has been reported, but twenty to thirty families have not been heard from.
