THE HOME KITCHEN

By Jeannette Young Norton Author of "Mrs. Norton's Cook Book." Five Ways to Make Coffee Serve Delicious Uses. Few modern housekeepers roast their own coffee. It can be prepared so conveniently, fresh and flavorful, at all prices, that there seems no need to do the extra work of roasting.

Coffee Pie Filling. Make one-half cup of strong coffee and scald with one cupful of milk, three quarters of a cupful of brown sugar and a half salt-ponful of salt. Add a half-cupful of large tapioca that has been soaked and boiled clear, cook all in a double boiler for ten minutes. Beat the yolks of two eggs with a little of the filling, then turn it into the rest and stir until it thickens, adding a dessertspoonful of vanilla. When slightly cool fill the cooked pie-crust with this cream. Cover the top with a good meringue and bake until it is a delicate brown.

Coffee Cake Filling. This recipe is for a French icing, or filling, which is rather rich, but it keeps well if in a cool dry place covered from the air. Take a cupful of sugar and a half-cupful of strong coffee and boil until the combination is rich and syrupy. Have ready a half-pound of unsalted butter worked to a cream with three-quarters of a pound of confectioner's sugar and a teaspoonful level of cornstarch. Stir in the coffee mixture and add a teaspoonful of vanilla flavoring. Stir until blended, cooled and thick enough to spread between the cakes layers and over the top and sides. Nats may be added to the cream, if liked.

Austrian Coffee Cake. Cream together a cupful of brown sugar and the yolks of four eggs. Add a cupful of flour sifted with a teaspoonful of baking powder, then beat in a tablespoonful of coffee essence, or a quarter-cupful of very strong coffee. Last of all, fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs. Bake in a moderate oven in two shallow buttered pans. When done, turn one onto a cake dish and spread with whipped cream, flavored, sweetened and having a few finely minced nuts in it. Place the other cake on top, and frost with a good mocha frosting. When cold, add the mocha frosting is hard, cut into squares and serve with coffee or tea.

Queen's Staff Wins From Theologues

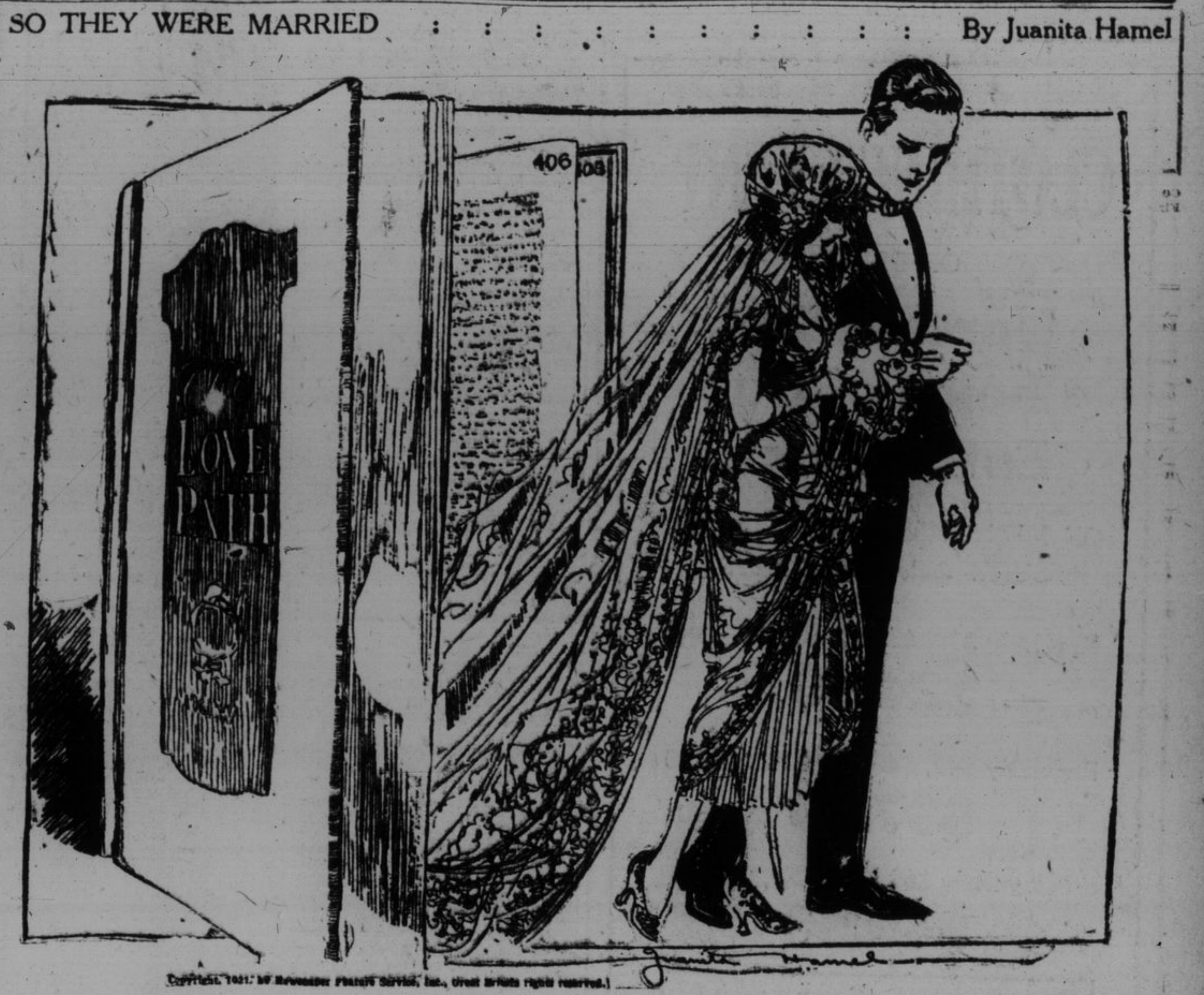
