other person. Her duty was to keep the house clean, and do washing, ironing, etc. There was no other help in the house. James had nothing to do with her staying in the house. Mrs. Maguire had secured the consent of her parents to stay, and while in the home was treated just like a member of the family. She looked after everything and was not like a servant, but more like one of the family.

Like Brother and Sister.
Witness said Mrs. Maguire was kind and affectionate. James and Mrs. Maguire got along well together, and treated each other like brother and sister. Witness said that nothing came under her notice to give an impression that the two had improper relations. There had not been anything to cause one to be suspicious. If so, she would have quickly put a stop to it. Mrs. Maguire wanted to sleep on a davenport downstairs, but "Joe" gave up his room upstairs for her and asked her to take it. James and Mrs. Maguire also went out in an auto a good deal, sometimes doing business for the house, and witness did not think there was anything wrong in this. They also went out fishing and to camps at Patterson and Mud Lake, accompanied by Mrs. Martin, mother of Mrs. Maguire. Witness also knew of other trips, made by James and Mrs. Maguire, and thought it was quite right.

Evidence From Norfolk.
Mr. Porter submitted evidence taken under commission from several residents of Norfolk, Virginia, where "Ray" Maguire and his wife lived for some time. He first read the testimony of Mrs. Charles de Ford. The letter stated that the conduct of "Ray" Maguire towards his wife and child was very unkind, while Mrs. Maguire was quiet and refined. He was very abusive to his wife and made her position most embarrassing, especially in company.
Witness believed that Mrs. Maguire feared her husband. He drank very heavily, and witness declared that he often kicked him over on the floor. He did not provide proper clothing for his wife and child, and did not buy enough fuel. Witness said that she had furnished linen for a bed in the Maguire home. There was no linen for the baby's bed. A bath robe was used, and the baby caught a cold. Witness had seen plaintiff drunk. He had told witness about having a wrist watch he intended giving to a woman he was going to marry after he got a divorce.
Witness declared that Mrs. Maguire was possessed of a sweet character. Plaintiff had told her that he went with other women.

Evidence given by M. O. Breck, Norfolk, was read, and in this the witness declared that the plaintiff had liquor in his apartments and also had women visit him there. He told of all-night parties where whiskey flowed very freely.
Mrs. Lily Davis, Norfolk, in her evidence, said that she thought plaintiff was very rough with his child. He would kick the child when there was no provocation whatever. He was also cruel to his wife. Mrs. Maguire was so different to her husband. She made no complaint and appeared to be afraid of him. She had very poor clothing and was poorly provided for. She

was not provided with the necessities of life. On one occasion witness noticed plaintiff in a "movie" picture show in company with a woman. At this time his wife was in Canada. On one occasion when the little boy was ill, plaintiff refused to pay for a doctor.

Drinking and Joyriding.
The evidence of George F. Hurdell, also of Norfolk, told about drinking parties in which plaintiff had been one of the principals. There were joy rides and lots of whiskey. Plaintiff also kept company with other women.
Mr. Clarke, who has an auto for hire in Norfolk, also added his evidence. He told of drinking parties at hotels, and joy rides in which plaintiff took part, and the evidence of Albert E. Stuts, a detective, was to the same effect.

Florence Garrett, Tichborne, who was a maid in the home of plaintiff and his wife during August, September and October, 1915, was on the stand. She said that plaintiff only spoke to his wife at times, and took little or no notice of his little boy. She had never seen him under the influence of liquor, but told of finding a revolver under his pillow. She buried the revolver in the back yard. When plaintiff missed the revolver he slapped his wife in the face and said: "I will find it and then you will be sorry."

Witness said that she and Mrs. Maguire were afraid of plaintiff. He had threatened both. His conduct worried his wife all the time.
To Mr. Cunningham, witness said that while she stayed in the Maguire home she was given plenty to eat and was well provided for.

Plaintiff Frequently Drunk.
Jennett Flaherty said she had served as maid in the Maguire home from September, 1914, till January, 1915. She declared that plaintiff "seemed to be rather crazy." When he was intoxicated, he would run around the house clad in his pajamas. She had known him to be drunk for a week at a time. On one occasion when he was drunk, he got his shoes burned in the fire place. The day following this incident plaintiff came home drunk carrying three new pairs of shoes. In four months' time witness declared that the plaintiff was drunk the greater part of the time. Witness said she often noticed Mrs. Maguire crying and that her life appeared to be one of misery. Plaintiff always kept a revolver on a table near his bed, with bullets. His wife was always good to him.

Witness told about Mrs. Maguire's mother providing clothing for the baby. Her mother also sent eggs to the house and other provisions as well. Her mother also provided her daughter with underclothing and boots. Plaintiff was kind to his child when sober, but rough when drinking. To the witness there did not appear to be any happiness in the home.

Evidence of Mother-in-law.
Mrs. Carrie Martin, mother-in-law of the plaintiff, gave evidence. She said she had been a life-long resident of Kingston. She told of plaintiff having liquor the third night he was home from his honeymoon. He became intoxicated. Witness had provided clothing for the baby's coming and also money. Plaintiff had asked her to do this, stating that his money was in trust. When his wife was in a delicate condition, plaintiff would come home intoxicated and annoy his wife by slamming the doors and making an unusual noise in the furnace room. Plaintiff had admitted to witness that he had struck his wife on one occasion, but expressed sorrow for his conduct, and said that such a thing would never occur again. He said he was going away and would try to be a better man. Plaintiff also told witness that he could not believe that his wife could do anything wrong. Witness did not see anything wrong in allowing her daughter to stay at the Maguire home on Union street.
Court adjourned at 6 p.m. Wednesday till 10 o'clock Thursday morning.

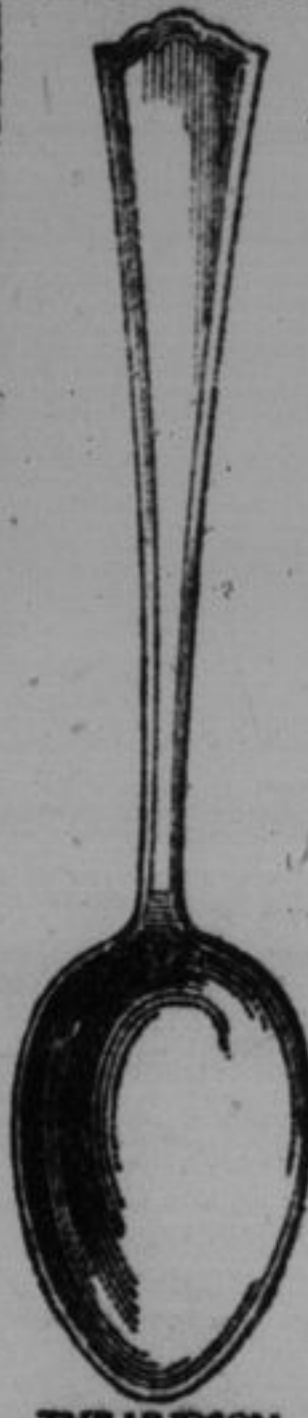

BRITISH LIBERALS TO LAUNCH ATTACK

Will Move Amendment in the House Condemning Policy in Ireland.

London, Feb. 17.—On Monday the Independent Liberals will move an amendment to the address in the House of Commons as follows:
"We humbly present to your majesty that the policy and practice pursued by the executive in Ireland have failed to secure the repression of organized offenders, have involved officers and servants of the crown in competition in crime with offenders against the law, have handed over to military authorities unreservedly the definition and punishment of offences and have frustrated the prospects of a settlement of the problem of Irish self-government."

The executive committee of the labor party has endorsed Lord Norley's demand for a public inquiry into the Mallow shooting affray, and for guarantees for the safety of railway men in the future. A large demonstration at Albert Hall under the auspices of the labor party passed a resolution demanding a judicial inquiry into reprisals and the with-
