Mrs. Maguire had secured the consent of her parents to stay, and while in the home was treated just like a member of the family. She looked after everything and was not like a servant, but more like one of the

Like Brother and Sister. Witness said Mrs. Maguire was kind and affectionate. James and Mrs. Maguire got along well together, and treated each other like brother and sister. iWtness said that nothing came under her notice to give an impression that the two had improper relations. There had not been anything to cause one to be suspicious. If so, she would have quickly put a stop to it. Mrs. Maguire wanted to sleep on a davenport downstairs, but "Joe" gave up his room upstairs for her and asked her to take it. James and Mrs. Maguire also went out in an auto a good deal, sometimes doing business for the house, and witness did not think there was anything wrong in this. They also went out fishing and to camps at Battersea and Mud Lake, accompanied by Mrs. Martin, mother of Mrs. Maguire. Witness also knew of other trips, made by James and Mrs. Maguire, and thought it was quite right.

Evidence From Norfolk. Mr. Porter submitted evidence taken under commission from severa residents of Nor. olk, Virginia, where 'Ray" Maguire and his wife lived for some time. He first read the testimony of Mrs. Charles de Ford The letter stated that the conduct of "Ray" Maguire towards his wife and child was very unkind, while Mrs. Maguire was quiet and refined. 
Witness declared that Mrs. Maruire was possessed of a sweet char-Plaintiff had told her that he went with other women.

Drinking and Joyriding. The evidence of George F. Hurdel, also of Norfolk, told about drinking parties in which plaintiff had been one of the principals. There were joy rides and lots of whiskey. Plaintiff also kept company with other

Mr. Clarke, who has an auto for hire in Norfolk, also added his evidence. He told of drinking parties at hotels, and joy rides in which plaintiff took part, and the evidence of Albert E. Stutts, a detective, was o the same effect. .

Florence Garrett, Tichborne, who was a maid in the home of plaintiff and his wife during August, September and October, 1915, was on the stand. She said that plaintiff only spoke to his wife at times, and took ittle or no notice of his little boy. She had never seen him under the influence of liquor, but told of finding a revolver under his pillow. She buried the revolver in the back yard. When plaintiff missed the revolver he slapped his wife in the face and said: "I'will find it and then you

Witness said that she and Mrs. Maguire were afraid of plaintiff.. He had threatened both. His conduct worried his wife all the time.

To Mr. Cunningham, witness said that while she stayed in the Maguire home she was given plenty to eat and was well provided for.

Plaintiff Frequently Drunk. Jennett Flaherty said she had served as maid in the Maguire home. from September, 1914, till January. 1915. She declared that plaintiff seemed to be rather crazy." When he was intoxicated, he would run around the house clad in his pajamas. She had known him to be drunk for a week at a time. On one occasion when he was drunk, he got his shoes burned in the fire place. The day following this incident plaintiff came home drunk carrying three new pairs of shoes. In four months' time witness declared that the plaintiff was drunk the greater part of the time. Witness said she often noticed Mrs. Maguire crying

Evidence of Mother-in-law. Mrs. Carrie Martin, mother-in-law of the plaintiff, gave evidence. She said she had been a life-long resident of Kingston. She told of plaintiff having liquor the third night he was home from his honeymoon. He became intoxicated. Witness had provided clothing for the baby's coming and also money. Plaintiff had asked her to do this, stating that his money was in trust. When his wife was in a delicate condition, plaintiff would come home intoxicated and sacoy his wife by slamming he doors and making an unusual noise in the furnace room. Plaintiff had admitted to witness that he had expressed sorow for his conduct, and said that such a thing would hever occur again. He said he was going away and would try to be a better man. Plaintiff also told witness that he could not believe that his wife could do anything wrong. Witness did not see anything wrong in allow-

ing her daughter to stay at the Maguire home on Union street. Court adjourned at 6 p.m. Wed nesday till 10 o'clock Thursday
