ARE SEEKING CO-OPERATION

In Regard to Marking of Historic Places in Kingston.

The Kingston Historical Society has under consideration an important programme in addition to arranging for a big celebration in 1923 and the new officials, with Major-General Macdonell as president, are engaged in active re-organization going to all citizens who are interested in its work to secure their co-operation and support. The matters under immediate consideration are the erection of memorial tablets over historic spots. The selection of these places is important, and the society is anxious to receive information and records from all persons who may be in a position to render any assistance. Three important places are quite definitely settled already. The first is the central part of the General Hospital used as the first meeting of the parliament of Canada; the second is the Simcoe House on Queen street, once the residence of Lord Simcoe, governor-general of Canada, and the third is the site of the original Fort Frontenac within the enclosure of Tete du Pont barracks. Tablets will be placed on the General Hospital and Simcoe house, and a memorial will be erected at a suitable place in the Tete du Pont barracks. The outline of old Fort Frontenac is still to be seen from what remains of the foundation walls on the ground of the barracks square. In 1923 the society will take a leading part in the arrangements for the celebration of the 250th anniversary of the founding of Kingston, and all historical societies in Ontario will be invited to send representatives. A monster pageant will be a feature of the celebration.

MEDICAL DOCTORS' IMPORTANT REQUESTS

Made to Premier Drury and the Minister of Health.

Toronto, Feb. 17.—Representing the Ontario Medical Association, a delegation of doctors from various cities in the province, including Dr. H. A. Boyce, Kingston, waited upon Premier Drury and Hon. Walter Rolfe, minister of health, this morning. The deputation urged:

(1) The advisability of making a survey of the amount of unattended sickness occurring in Ontario; (2) the advisability of transferring the present medical school and nursing institution from the department of education to the health department; (3) the real necessity for measures which will guarantee continuous and efficient standardization of drugs; (4) the necessity for carrying post-graduate teaching to the more remote places where practitioners cannot leave their homes to attend institutions of learning.

The medical men also requested a grant of ten thousand dollars, towards a fund to assist the association's committee on education in connection with a post-graduate schedule it had arranged.

The premier promised that the cabinet would give serious consideration to the requests.

ACCUSE AMERICANS OF LOOTING SUPPLIES

Charge Made That 38,000 Automobiles Sold to France Were Stolen.

Paris, Feb. 17.—That Americans in charge of army war stocks which had been sold to France for \$400,000,000 stole enormous amounts of supplies owing to disorder and lack of proper guarding of the camps was the startling charge made in the Chamber of Deputies by Emanuel Brousse, former Under-Secretary in charge of the liquidation of war stocks.

This statement is confirmed, according to L'intransigeant, by an official Government report which states that the United States authorities sold, unknown to the French, large quantities of merchandise already bought by France.

According to an investigation made by M. Vavasseur, Deputy from Indre-et-Loire, among the stocks which disappeared are 38,000 automobiles and motor trucks worth 700,000,000 francs.

The report does not charge the Americans with making away with all that has vanished, but an official inquiry is to be made to fix the responsibility.

Sultan Abdicates to Son.

The Hague, Feb. 17.—The aged Sultan of Jogyakarta, Java, one of the two powerful and wealthy potentates of the Dutch East Indies, has decided to abdicate in favor of his eldest son, the Crown Prince of Jogyakarta, who has been trained in European ways in Holland. Before leaving here for the Indies, a few weeks ago, the young man informed his father that he would not take the sultan's throne unless the abdicating potentate, with his entire court, removed to another town than Jogyakarta, and the father consented, rather than cause trouble.

One man was killed and thousands of persons crowding lower Broadway, New York, were thrown into a panic to-day when a manhole exploded.

Early opening of navigation is forecast by ice conditions. St. Mary's river is expected to be clear for traffic between the Soos by the end of the week.

Alexander Howatt, Pittsburg, Kan., president of the Kansas Miners' union, was found guilty of contempt of court and sentenced to jail.
