 This sketch, drawn from a photograph, shows the site of
 the Imperial Oil Co.'s gusher on the bank of the Mackenzie
 river, fifty miles beyond Fort Norman, near the Arctic circle,
 and 1,200 miles north of Edmonton. Geologists have long
 looked on the district as promising, because of surface seep-
 ages which often collect in pools or drain into the river. On
 the above site the first, and as yet the only boring in the dis-
 trict, was made last August and at about 700 feet a gusher was
 struck.
