A meeting of the United Farmers Co-Operative company took place on Saturday afternoon and addresses were given by Messrs Martin and Powers, Toronto, who are making a tour of inspection of the stores operated by the United Farmers in different parts of the province of Ontario. A report on the U.F.O. store situated on Brock street, Kingston, was presented and the announcement was made that the directors would not distribute any profits on the first year's operations owing to the large initial expense. It was shown that the business of the store for the year! amounted to \$73,000. Some farmers thought that the store should take care of all surplus butter and eggs brought to Kingston and be in a position to give groceries, etc., in exchange. This was not done and the farmers were obliged to take their butter, eggs, etc., to other city stores, and, as a matter of course, they bought their supplies from the stores that traded with them. They felt that the co-operative store should take of this kind of business; as well as hay
