OBITUARY

Late Robert L. Sanders.

EFFICIENT MANAGEMENT OF HOTEL RENFREW

Mr. and Mrs. Colson Have Got That Popular Institution on Paying Basis.

At the meeting of the shareholders of the Renfrew Hotel Company Limited in Hotel Renfrew, the outstanding feature of the directors' report was that, after a couple of unprofitable years, partly due to the building of the wing and partly to furnishing accommodation for some time at too low a rate; now, under the careful and popular management of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Colson, the institution was again approaching the paying point. After meeting the losses of the first two months of the year, there had been left enough profit to equal about 4 1/2 per cent. on the paid-up capital stock. This was not appropriated to the payment of a dividend but to reduction of the mortgage.
Appreciation was expressed by the directors in their report and by the shareholders also in formal motion, of the good work of Mr. and Mrs. Colson. The shareholders also expressed appreciation of the work of the directors and officers, who were all re-elected. At the subsequent meeting of the directors, W. E. Shallfield was re-elected president; J. McN. Austin, vice-president; and Hugh Macdonald, secretary-treasurer. The other members of the Board are A. A. Wright, Thos. A. Low, J. L. Murray, S. T. Chown, J. A. Jamieson, H. Coolican and J. J. McFadden. Orange Wright was re-elected auditor.

The Late Mrs. Toner.

Rockwood Appropriations.

MRS. HENRY JOSEPH

A Former Kingston Girl, a Leader in Montreal.

Mrs. Henry Joseph, recently elected president of the Women's Branch of the National Liberal and Conservative party, Montreal district, is eminently fitted by education, ability and experience to take a leading place in the political arena into which women are now entering. Her activities along patriotic, philanthropic, political and social lines have been many and varied. At the present time Mrs. Joseph is Vice-Regent of the Municipal Chapter of the I.O.D.E. and Regent of the Wolfe and Montcalm Chapter. She is on the board of directors of the University Settlement and was for a number of years president of the Sanctuary Guild of the Church of St. James the Apostle and hon. vice-president of the Housewives' League. During the war Mrs. Joseph made recruiting speeches on Dominion Square, and a Red Cross Circle which she organized met regularly at her home, while in the Victory Loan campaign she captained one of the teams. She has always taken a keen interest in politics, and belonged to an organization which in 1911 secured 30,000 votes against reciprocity. In the 1917 campaign Mrs. Joseph rendered valuable assistance to Union Government candidates by her platform speeches and recitations.

Mrs. Joseph belongs to a family whose annals are embodied in the history of Canada. Her grandfather, Charles Walkem, R.E., was sent out by the British Government in 1843 to settle the boundary line between Canada and the United States under the Ashburton Treaty. Her father, Dr. R. T. Walkem, K.C., Kingston, was an intimate friend of Sir John A. Macdonald, and for many years held the position of chancellor of the Diocese of Ontario. Her uncle, George A. Walkem, was Premier of British Columbia for several terms and not noted for his brilliant leadership. Major George A. Walkem, R.E., and Lieut.-Col. H. C. Walkem, D.S.O., Mrs. Joseph's two brothers, served with distinction in the Great War. Mrs. Joseph is a gifted orator and has used this talent on many occasions to help worthy objects.
