ERNE MARKS AT GRAND INCIDENTS OF THE DAY

Company Delights Another Large Audience—To Have Amateur Night.

That the Ernie Marks Stock Company is ever popular in Kingston was shown at the Grand last night when the company put on "The Price," as the second offering of its week's engagement. Another big audience was present and the play was greatly enjoyed, every member of the cast carrying out their part in finished style. There were four acts, with specialties between each one, and it was a well pleased audience that left the theatre after the final act. THE KING'S DAUGHTERS

The Splendid Work That Has Been Done by the Circle.

The twenty-fourth annual meeting of the city union of the circles of King's Daughters, was held in Sydenham street hall on Tuesday afternoon. The president, Miss Gertrude Strange, before the reports were read, reminded the members that the badge of the order, a silver, maitreese cross, used to be always worn by the members and hoped it would again become the rule.

Mrs. W. M. Campbell read the report of the Lent-A-Hand Circle, of which Mrs. H. VanLaven is president, and revealed an amazing amount of good work done by this circle—the supper given to children of the mission school of Sydenham street church, treats and visits at the Home for the Aged, as well as gifts to the old folk. Visits and dainty Christmas gifts to the General Hospital, as well as needed articles for use in that institution. Money given to the sufferers from the Barrieheld hutments' fire, to the Chamber of Commerce, and to missions, were among the many good works to which the members had "lent-a-hand."

Miss Ruth Anglin read the report of the Charitable Circle, of which Miss Gertrude Strange has been president for twenty-nine years, during which time she has done more for the uplift of the poorer members of the community than any other one woman in the city, organizing the food and fuel club, by which money is collected weekly, by a band of young girls, who from April to November visit from 150 to 200 families on their list. This year \$2,000 was collected by these willing workers, who, during rain or shine, call regularly each week for the 10-cent pieces, quarters, or in good times, a dollar saved in this way for food or fuel that would otherwise be spent on things less useful. "The visiting lady," or "the collector," is beloved in the northern end of the town. At Christmas baskets are sent with little personal gifts, as well as Christmas fare, for each child in the two hundred families as known to the girls who visit them. The money saved is given back in coal and food, and clothing, either made by the skillful fingers of the workers or if collected is kept at the home of the president, ready for an emergency, as the sufferers of the Barrieheld fire and many another have found to their joy. The hospitals are not forgotten, nor the missions of the east, an orphan from the Zenanas of India benefiting from the funds.

Other charities give to the needy, but the King's Daughters alone provide a way to help them to cease to be needy, and to become self-supporting, useful citizens.

Mrs. Campbell and Miss Ruth Anglin gave their impressions of the King's Daughters' convention at Ganabogue.

The officers are: President, Miss G. Strange; vice-presidents, Mrs. A. Strachan, Mrs. Edwin Walsh and Miss Van Straubensee; treasurer, Miss Helen Fraser; secretary, Miss Etta Smith.
