Miss Gertrude Strange has been president for twenty-nine years, during which time she has done more for the uplift of the poorer members of the community than any other one woman in the city, organizing the food and fuel club, by which money is collected weekly by a band of young girls, who from April to November visit from 150 to 200 families on their list. This year \$2,000 was collected by these willing workers, who, during rain or shine, call regularly each week for the 10-cent pleces, quarters, or in good times, a dollar saved in this way for food or fuel that would otherwise be spent on things less useful. "The visiting lady," or "the collector," is beloved n the northern end of the town. At-Christmas baskets are sent with little personal gifts, as well as Christmas fare, for each child in the two hundred families as known to the girls who visit them The money saved is given back in coal and food , and clothing, either made by the skilful fingers of the owrkers or if collected is kept at the home of the president, ready for an emergency, as the sufferers of the Barriefield fire and many another have found to their joy. The hospitals are not forgotten, nor the missions of the east, an orphan from the Zenanas of India benefiting from the funds.
