A Real Century Note.
A curiosity in the shape of a bank bill more than a hundred years old is possessed by J. Burns, Prince George Hotel, Toronto. It states that "the president and directors of the Bank of Upper Canada promise to pay the bearer \$2, payable on demand out of the funds, joint funds of the association and no other." On top it is stated: "Payable at Bank of Canada, Montreal." It is dated Kingston, Jan. 1st, 1820.

Postmaster Convalescing.
Herbert J. Kilburn, postmaster at Grennell Island, N.Y., on the St. Lawrence river, is steadily improving at St. Joachim's hospital, where he has been a patient for several weeks. Mr. Kilburn suffered from an infection of the left leg resulting from the circulation becoming impeded. Two operations were necessary, the first removing the left foot and the second amputating the leg above the knee. For several days his recovery was despaired of, but he is now gaining.

Horses Burned To Death.

Picton Organizes Protest.
The action of Canadian National officials in cutting off the early morning and evening Trenton to Picton trains has met with strong disapproval on the part of citizens of Picton and county of Prince Edward. Notice has been sent to 300 members of the Board of Trade which will convene in a special meeting to consider the matter. A telegram of protest has been sent to President Hanna requesting the presence of a representative at the meeting. Unless the order is rescinded or some equally satisfactory service given, C. P. R. officials will be at once approached with a proposition to extend their service to the county.

Offered Congratulations.
On the occasion of the recent marriage of Edward Bradden, Barriefield, a number of the representative men of Frontenac gathered at his home to wish him well. Mr. Bradden is one of Pittsburgh's most progressive young farmers, a director of the Kingston Industrial fair, and a leader in the United Farmers movement in the county. Thus the new home at Barriefield unites all that is best in the traditions and achievements of Pittsburgh township.

Congratulations were offered to the bride and groom by R. J. Bushell, Thomas Doyle and James Henderson, in the name of the industrial exhibition directorate. Rev. Mr. Cooke, on behalf of St. Mark's congregation; James Bell for Kingston township; whilst Rev. Dr. Kingsley, who acted as chairman, brought greetings from his parish to the former parishioners. In the names of Mr. and Mrs. Bradden's innumerable friends present and absent, Gordon Doyle read an address, and James Baxter presented them with a beautiful cabinet of china and cut glass.
